IR UNDERSIGNED has been appointed a Commissioner to irrestigate, collect and pry over to the parties entitled thereto; all officers for bount 'arrearages of pay and allow; ances, due to the representatives of depacted officers and soldiers from this State.

The parties entitled are: first, the widow of the deceased, if any, if there be no widow then, secondly, the child or children, if there be such, if the beneither while or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be neither widew, child, children or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these then, hithly, the executor or administrator of the dicessed.

The clain ant or claimath must fu nish his, her or their attidavit, and that of one disinterested witness as to the relationship, and in all cases, where the climant is not the widow, the adida it must not the land of selection and or clear ants of a light thing. The selection of the least of the credibility of the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is

a Justice of the Peace. It the claimant or claimants be a child or children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the laim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk.

Whe the claim is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or administratorship must be certified to, und r seal by the County Court Clerk All of these papers should be sent in dapli-

Any person directly interested will be furnish ed, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full; a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as oon as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claim-

ants all experse. Parties interested may materially aid me in the investigation of their claims, if at the time of forwarding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the deceased, where he died, was killed, whether or not they or any one for them, have received the personal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and wheth r or not the deceased (if a no a commissioned officer or private,) had ever received the State's bounty.

It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early a day as may be practicable. In all cases, give the claimants' Post Office and County in full.

Fighting in North Carolina. EVACUATION OF PLYMOUTH DY OUR FORCES, UNDER GEN. BA.

KER, AFTER A SEVERE FIGHT. GotosBore', Nov. 1 .- A special to the State Journal from near Plymouth, dated 253, vis thicky Mount, the ist, says: After three days hard fighting the enemy passed up Middle river and came d wn the Roan ke this morning. Gen Baker commanded the garrison in person, and fought until the enemy's gunboats kad passed one fort and dismounted all our guns in the other. The evacuation was then ordered under a severe shelling, which was effected without much loss.

Col. Whitford acted with conspicuous bravery.

RELEASE OF BRAINE AND ASSO-SOCIATES, FOR THE BURN NG OF THE STEAMER ROANOKE.

WILMINGTON, NOV 1. Journal has re c ived Bermuda advices to the 12 h and 19th ult., containing the trial and refere of Acting Master J. C. Braine, C. S. N and associates, for the burning of the steamer Roanoks.

They were released on the 12th and set at liberty. The charges against them have been withdrawn by the Attorney General.

THE TENNESSEE RIVER BLOCKA-DED BY FORREST-IMPORTANT CAPTURE, &c.

Paris, Tenn., Oct. 30, via Corinth, 31. -Major General Forrest has the Tennessee river blockaded. He captured at Fort linson, yesterday, a transport which ad in tow one large barge. Her boiler was cut in two on the second fire. The boats drifted down on the opposite side, and were brought over by ropes. We got off 60 wagon loads of shoes, boots, blankers and h rd bread. , Gunboats came up and shelled the transport and barge, which were destroyed, but the goods on shore were saved. Five transports and one gunbost are above Forrest's batteries.

The enemy are moving everything from Paducah across the river. They have ie n removing five-transports p r day up to Johnsonville, heavily luden with supplies.
