neers and soldiers from this State. The parties entitled are: first, the widow of the deceased, if any, if there be no widow then, secondly, the child or children, if the e be such, if there be neither widow or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be neither widow, child, children or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these then, fifthly, the executor or administra

tor of the deceased. The clain aut or claimants must fu nish his. her or their adidavit, and that of one deinterested witness as to the relationship, and in air eases, where the cl imant is not the widow, the a didavit must negative the existence of a claimant or claimants of a higher order. The Justize of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed must certify to the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is a Justice of the Peace.

If the claimant or claimants be a child or children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk.

When the clair is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or administratorship must be certified to, und r seal by the County Court Clerk

All of these papers should be sent in apeli-

Any person directly interested will be furnish ed, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full; a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as don as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claim-

ants all expense. Parties Interested may materially aid me in the investigation of their claims, if at the time it forwarding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the decessd, where he died, was killed, whether or not they or any one for them, have received the personal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and whether or not the deceased (if a non-commissioned officer of private,) had ever received the State's bounty

It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early a day as may be practicable. In all cases, give the claimants' Post Odice and County in full.

NORTHERN NEWS.

RICHMOND, Nov. 12 .- 1t was reported this morning, on good authority, that the au horities at Washington had issued an order prohibiting the communication of any intelligence with respect to the result of the late election, either by telegraph, railroad, stars coach, or otherwise. The news is confirmed by an officer at the lines below Richmond, who has heretofore made the exchange of newspapers for the Richmond press. He says upon going out for papers this morning, he was informed by the Yankee officer that orders had been received for idding an exchange. How long it would last he could not tell. He said further that it was his belief that Lincoln is elected, but that the returns were very unreliable.

RICHMOND, Nov. 12th .- New York and Baltimorr papers of Wednesday have been received. The N. Y. Herald announces the re-election of Lincoln The Baltimore American, evening edition, contains the the latest returns. A New York telegram says the Tribune claims for Lincoln all the New England States, Pennsylvanic, Delaware, New York, Maryland, Onio Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin Minnesota, Iowa, and Kansas, with a total majority of one hundred and ninety electoral votes. The New York Congressional delegation stands 22 Union to 9 Demo-

The Herald says Fernando Wood has defeate Brooks by a majority of 125.

The New York World concedes Lincoln's election, claiming, however, New York, Kentucky, New Jersey and Mis. souri for McClellan.

.The Tribune claims only 3,000 majority in New York.
