CLAIMS of Deceased Officers and Soldiers.

Wilson, N. C., June 20th, 1864.
I, the undersigned, has been appointed a Commissioner to investigate, collect and pay over to the parties entitled thereto, all claims for bounty, arrears of pay and allowances, due to the representatives of deceased officers and soldiers from this State.

The parties entitled are: first, the widow of the deceased, if any, if there be no widow then, secondly, the child or children, if there be such, if there be neither widow or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be neither widow, child, children or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these then, fifthly, the executor or administrator of the deceased.

The claimant or claimants must furnish his, her or their affidavit, and that of one disinterested witness as to the relationship, and in all cases, where the claimant is not the widow, the affidavit must negative the existence of a claimant or claimants of a higher order. The Justice of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed, must certify to the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is a Justice of the Peace.

If the claimant or claimants be a child or children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk.

When the claim is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or administratorship must be certified to, under seal by the County Court Clerk.

All of these papers should be sent in application.

Any person directly interested will be furnished, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full; a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as soon as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claimants all expense.

Parties interested may materially aid me in the investigation of their claims, if at the time of forwarding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the deceased, where he died, was killed, whether or not they or any one for them, have received the personal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and whether or not the deceased (if a non-commissioned officer or private) had ever received the State's bounty.

It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early a day as may be practicable. In all cases, give the claimants' Post Office and County in full.

From the Valley.

NEW MARKET, Nov. 16.—Lieut. Baylor, of the 12th Cavalry, with 12 men, captured 10 prisoners and 17 horses, within three miles of Harper's Ferry, and brought them safely to this place. They report the railroad running in order to Summit Point, 15 miles below Winchester.

NORTHERN NEWS.

MOBILE, Nov. 16th.—A special to the Advertiser from Senatobia, 15th, says the Chicago Tribune of the 9th has been received.

Canada dispatches of the 10th say that effective steps have been taken to preserve peace on the border.

The propellor Georgia was seized at Chamberstown, Canada West, by the Collector of Customs. She was believed to be fitting out for a privateer.

The St. Alban's examination proceeds slowly.

A battle is believed imminent in the Shenandoah Valley.

RICHMOND, Nov. 17.—The Baltimore American of Thursday evening, has been received.

Gen. Canby, while ascending White river on the gunboat Crocket, was shot by guerillas, from the shore, and wounded in the groin. His recovery is doubtful.

The boiler of the gunboat Tulip exploded on the Potomac river, Friday, killing all on board except ten. Sixty lives were lost.

A Washington telegram says Sherman has been in communication with the capital but nothing settled in regard to the

The Wachusett has arrived at Fortress Monroe with the Florida in tow.

Telegrams from Cairo say that the rebels have disappeared from Johnsonville. In New York on Monday gold was selling at 244.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

RICHMOND, Nov. 16.—European advices are to the 4th inst. The seizure of the Florida had been telegraphed by her commander, Captain Morris, to the Confederate Agents in London. The London Times says that the seizure was an act of piracy. The London Herald recommends that all the maritime powers interfere if the Florida be not given up.

It is stated that the steamer Laura from Liverpool had transferred crew, armament and ammunition to the New Albama off Madeira.

A hurricane at Calcutta on the 5th ult. drove 150 vessels from their moorings, stranded and damaged them. 12,000 persons were drowned.

FROM SAVANNAH.

SAVANNAH, Nov. 16.—To-night 1103 of our prisoners were brought up by the Yankees. About one third were sick and otherwise disabled. The whole number so far received a little exceeds 3100. The delivery of Yankee prisoners will begin on Thursday.
