**AN ORDINANCE**  
For the Better Preservation of Quiet and Order in the Town of Fayetteville.  
1. Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Commissioners of the town of Fayetteville, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that it shall not be lawful for any person or number of persons to march through the streets of said town, with drum and other noisy instruments, or to organize any Company or Companies for military drill, or to parade the streets with guns or arms of any sort, except the same be done by special leave of competent authority, or under the regular appointment of officers of the town or Federal government.  
2. Be it further Ordained, that if any person or persons shall violate in any manner or form, the provisions of this Ordinance, or consent, aid or encourage its violation, he, she or they shall be subject to arrest by any constable, guardsmen or policeman, and upon being so arrested, if in the day-time, shall be brought immediately before the Mayor, and upon conviction of the violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be fined at his discretion, not exceeding \$200, nor less than \$5. If the violation shall occur in the nighttime, the offender shall be arrested and lodged in the Guard House until next day, when he shall be brought before the Mayor and dealt with as above provided.

**REGULATIONS,**  
**Under Various Ordinances of the Town of Fayetteville, concerning Hauling Drays, Wagons, &c.**  
That no Wagon, Cart or Dray shall be permitted to run for the purpose of hauling goods, wares or merchandise, without first obtaining a License, and giving a security for the same, with approved surety.  
That any person running a dray, wagon or cart without such license, shall be liable to a fine of five dollars for each load so hauled.  
That the driver of such wagon, cart or dray, shall be an abedded person.  
That drays, wagons and carts shall draw in turn, according to mill rule; under a penalty of one dollar.

**TOWN ORDINANCES.**  
*The Following Ordinances are Published for the Benefit of all Concerned.*  
1. Any person who shall place, or cause to be placed, any rubbish, filth, stable manure, or any noxious or offensive matter, in any street, lane or estate removal, shall be liable to a fine of five dollars.  
2. Any person who shall have a stable, pig-sty, or any out-houses on their premises, within the limits of the town, and who shall keep the same in such a manner that the filth and stench thereof shall become offensive to or annoy any person, the owner or occupant of said stable shall be liable to a fine of five dollars for each and every day the same is allowed after notice.  
3. A complaint-book will be opened at the Mayor's office, and the citizens are requested to enter on said book any suggestions or complaints they may wish to make: Such entries will receive immediate attention.  
4. Citizens are requested to enter in the above book information as to any case of small-pox or other contagious sickness, which may break out in their neighborhood.  
5. When the owner or occupants of a house refuse or neglect to put their out-houses in order, the Sanitary Commissioner for the time being may be empowered to have the place properly cleaned, and the expenses thereof will be collected from the owner or occupants of the house.  
6. The Sanitary Commissioner has a right and is hereby empowered to visit and inspect the out-houses and yards of all buildings within the limits of the town, between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M.  
7. The Sanitary Commissioner has a right and is hereby empowered to arrest and place in confinement all persons guilty of any disorderly conduct within the limits of the town.  
8. Persons residing within the limits of the town, who have cellars under their houses, wells, or on any part of their lands, which contain stagnant water, shall be liable to a fine of five dollars for each and every day the same is allowed after notice.  
9. The Mayor and Commissioners earnestly request that all persons residing in the town of Fayetteville and its vicinity, will once place or cause to be placed their sewers, yards and out-houses in good order, and to keep them as clean as possible during the warm weather.  
10. Mr. Thos. Stephens is hereby appointed Sanitary Commissioner.

**The Stamp Act,**  
ONE OF THE TAX LAWS OF THE U. S.  
ACKNOWLEDGMENT—of deeds exempt 5 cents  
AFFIDAVIT in suit or legal proceedings exempt  
AGREEMENT or APPRAISEMENT—for each sheet of paper on which the same is written 5 cents  
ASSIGNMENT of Mortgages, Leases or policy of insurance, the same duty as on the original instrument. 5 cents  
PATENT right 5 cents  
BANK DEBITS, DRAFTS OR ORDERS, &c.—at sight or on demand 2 cents  
BILLS OF EXCHANGE, INLAND—draft or order payable otherwise than at sight or on demand, or any promissory note whatever, payable on demand or at a time designated, [except bank notes issued for circulation, and checks made and intended to be, and which shall be forthwith presented for payment] for a sum not exceeding \$100 5 cents  
For every additional hundred dollars, or fractional part thereof 5 cents  
BILLS OF LADING—of vessels for ports of the United States or British North America exempt  
Or receipt for goods on any foreign ports 10 cents  
BILL OF SALE—of any vessel, or part thereof when the consideration does not exceed five hundred dollars 50 cents  
Exceeding \$500 and not exceeding \$1000 50 cents  
Exceeding \$1,000, for each \$500, or fractional part thereof 50 cents  
Of personal property [other than ship or vessel] 5 cents  
BOND—personal, for payment of money [see Mortgage] 10 cents  
For indemnifying any person for the payment of any sum of money, where the money ultimately recoverable thereupon is \$100 or less 50 cents  
Where the money recoverable exceeds \$100, for every additional \$1,000, or fractional part thereof 50 cents

**AN ACT**  
To establish a Scale of Depreciation of Confederate Currency.  
WHEREAS, By an ordinance of the Convention, entitled "An ordinance declaring what laws and ordinances are in force, and for other purposes," ratified on the 18th day of October, A. D., 1865, it is made the duty of the General Assembly to provide a scale of depreciation of the Confederate Currency from the time of its first issue to the end of the war; and it is further therein declared that "all excecutory contracts, solvent in money, whether under seal or not, made after the depreciation of said currency before the 1st of May, 1865, and unfilled (except official bonds and certificates payable to the State), shall be deemed to have been made with the understanding that they were solvent in money of the said currency," subject, nevertheless, to evidence of different intent of the parties to the contract; therefore  
Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the following scale of depreciation be and the same is hereby adopted and established as the measure of value of one gold dollar in Confederate currency, for each month, and the fractional parts of the month of December, 1864, from the 1st day of November, 1861, to the 1st day of May, 1865, to wit:

And whereas, many grave and difficult disputes may arise between executors, administrators, guardians and trustees, and their legal representatives, wards and assigns, in the settlement of the estates of deceased testators and trusts, arising from the depreciation of Confederate currency, State treasury notes and bank notes, in view to their growing out of the late war; and that it is to be feared that many litigations may be instituted, and it is hereby enacted, That in all such cases, the parties are hereby empowered to form a full and perfect statement of the case on both sides, which case shall be committed to the determination of one of the Justices of the Superior Courts, chosen by the parties, who is hereby authorized to consider and determine the same, according to equity and good conscience; Provided, however, That no part of this section shall be construed to stop or hinder any person from proceeding in the usual course of law, if he shall deem the same necessary.

Ordered—That all carriages and other vehicles, carrying passengers for pay, shall pay to the town the same amount as a charge on a carriage, or of gross weight, and that the rate of fare charged by such vehicles, shall be 50 cents for a passenger and his trunk to or from the River; and 25 cents for a passenger and his trunk to or from the Rail Road depot to any part of Town except to the River, as above; and dray rates for any baggage over the one price.
