THE LADIES' MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION OF FREDERICKSBURG, VA.—We gladly give space in our columns to the "Appeal for the Unrecorred Dead," which will be found on the next page. It is presented to the bereaved and sorrowing people of the South, in behalf of a sacred cause, which is endeared to our hearts by the sad and touching records of hardship, privation and death, to be found in the memories of every stricken household, in the annals of every march and campaign, and in the terrible history of every field where many true and brave have fallen, and are now resting in mournful appeal to the gratitude of the country, for which they became a "noble army of martyrs." Had we the means, how gladly would a large portion be contributed to the accomplishment of the noble ends so tenderly and beautifully set forth by these true-hearted women of Virginia.

Ours has become indeed a "lost cause," and in duty to the past and the future, we have not only been led, but we have every hope that we had cherished, and relinquished the principles which we had fought and struggled to establish, and our honest and true allegiance is due to the government to whose authority and power we have yielded.

But our dead are our own. Yes, our dead are our own. Their fortunes and their lives were staked and lost in our defence, and "to rescue from oblivion the memory" of those who died thus, is the least of the task which we and our children and our children's children must labor to perform.

But while we thus commend to the aid and support of our people, the undertaking of the ladies of Virginia, we must not forget in any wise neglect. Last week we mentioned an appeal which must be regarded even if another is received. It is narrow charity which begins "at home"—and goes no farther; but we must not step over the still and upturned corpse in our own house to go and weep with our neighbor.

Not six hours journey from our town, the bones of men are lying, who, eighteen months since, marched into our streets, haggard, suffering, rugged and weary, and with a proud and martial step—through all their dust and misery, defenders still; true, unflinching, valiant to the last bitter end.

And our old and sorely tried citizens, who had sons afar off in the ranks of the army—fathers and mothers who uttered a prayer daily for their lips, and cherished one hourly in their hearts, for those "for whom the place was kept at hearth and board so long" wives, sisters and maidens, dreaming and waiting and hoping for husbands and brothers, and lovers—had these raised their heads and their spirits for a moment, from the despair into which they were drooping, when the invading army, with its serried hosts, and rumbling cannon and wagons, and flaunting banners, had passed into the distance like the confused image of a hideous dream, and listened to the sounds which came back with the moaning wind, they might have heard, like a knell on the heart, like the tap on a muffled drum or a corpse, the faint, solemn boom that told that the field of Avershoro" was receiving its bloody, ghastly burden.

O, faithful, brave, heroic! O, true and manly hearts thus snatched in twain, without a face to bend above you in the agony of death, without an eye to beam upon you in the last throes of the spirit, but the pitiless face of the plunderer, the gleaming eye of the assassin! Went up through midnight's breathless gloom, And the vain yearning soul mid festival song "Where in the 'sunny' South is the anxious heart breaking, breaking day by day! Bones lying on the plains where the roaming brutes feed, and heaped up in the forests and by the streams where all a silence and forgetfulness! Bones of men whose grand battles and heroic charges will be repeated and declaimed and applauded by posterity when we are indeed forgotten in the dust! It must not be. We must be up and doing in this work.

BY THIS MORNING'S MAIL.
FROM WASHINGTON.

The Secretary of State has addressed a letter to Sir, Frederick Lynch in behalf of Lynch and McMahon, returned to Canada in a colonial Court of Canada and sentenced to death upon a charge that, being citizens of the United States, they were not in the Fenian raid, he says that the United States Consul at Toronto has been instructed to procure, for the information of the conviction and also of all further trials and convictions of a similar character which shall take place in Canada.

The Secretary says: "The President directs me to assure you of his confident hope that his Majesty's Government will not only cheerfully comply with the request thus made, but that they will think it proper to examine the judicial proceedings aforesaid with a careful regard to the rights of the United States and to the maintenance of good relations between the two countries, and to the extent it will be very gratifying to the President if you should be able to give me an assurance that the execution of the sentences pronounced upon convicted persons will be suspended, if occasion for delay shall arise in the manner before mentioned which is desirable. It is the opinion of the government that sound policy coincides with the best impulses of a benevolent nature in recommending tenderness, amnesty and forgiveness.

The New York Herald's Toronto special says that dispatches are coming in from all the Fenian raid, mandating that no mercy be shown the convicted Fenians.

The threats made by the New York Fenians to avenge the death of those convicted, are doing great injury to the prisoners.

Washington, October 29. Miss Fanny Seward, daughter of the Secretary of State, died this morning.

The Committee appointed by Tammany Hall to call on the President, with a view of obtaining executive interference in case of American citizens condemned to death at Toronto, had an interview this morning. The President said he had anticipated the correspondence as would be perceived by copies of the correspondence published this morning. He expressed his sympathy with their mission. Interview very satisfactory to the Committee.

Washington, October 29. Further discoveries are being made of forgeries of Judges' names to naturalization papers in this city.

New York, Oct. 29. The Democratic and National Union Committees have passed resolutions, requesting the Government to make speedy interference for the safety and protection of Lynch and McMahon.

An immense meeting has been held in Buffalo of sympathy for the prisoners.

Toronto, October 27. The trial of other Fenians will probably not be commenced before Wednesday. Mr. McKenzie who is retained by the American Consul to defend such as are Americans, not being ready for trial.
