FERTILITY OF EGYPT. That vast grain

growing country, which has been celebra ted from the earliest historical periods a the most productive in the staple articles of human food, the valley of the Nile, is a narrow strip of land, averaging only about ten miles in width. It is animal matter, not unlike fish-namure, which is known to be the best fertilizer the fature er can put upon his fields.
