Superior Court in Session.

The Superior Court of Cumberland County, for the trial of civil cases only, convened Monday morning, with Judge Olive H. Allen presiding. The calendar was gone over and a number of cases were continued.

In the case of Joseph Shaw, adm'r of Duncan Shaw, vs. the A. C. L. Railroad for \$50,000, which it was expected would occupy several days of this week in trial, has been settled out of court, the railroad agreeing to pay several thousand dollars, the exact amount of which will not be learned until the judgment is signed.
