

WALKER FOUND GUILTY.

Henry Walker, the negro charged with entering the house of Mr. L. Banks Holt and shooting him Tuesday night, was Friday last found guilty of burglary in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged.

He voted the Democratic ticket for 75 years.

On Tuesday in Beaver Dam Township, Mr. Heman Bryant, 96 years of age, voted the straight Democratic ticket, making the 37th successive election in which he has voted that ticket. He has been voting for 75 years.

Mortuary Report.

The mortuary report of Dr. A. S. Rose, city physician, for October, shows a total of 14 deaths for that month—11 whites and 3 colored. Two whites died of gastritis; one each of consumption, paralysis, morasmus, suicide, typhoid fever, diphtheria, general debility, brain disease, heart disease. Of the colored, one died of consumption, one of bronchitis and one was burned to death. Four of the whites were under 5 years of age.

Innocent Negroes in Burlington.

A dispatch from Burlington to the News and Observer of Saturday says: A negro barber named Crater was in Mr. Will Holt's office this morning. Mr. Holt asked him about some remarks he had been making about the trial in progress at Graham, being in the nature of threats against some of the witnesses. He answered Mr. Holt very insolently, whereupon Mr. Holt knocked him down. When he got up he made at Mr. Holt with a razor. Mr. Holt drew a revolver and shot at him. But for the interference of his brother, Mr. H. L. Holt, he would have killed him. The negro ran down stairs and while doing so lost four dollars and three or four razors. The negro Crater and three other negroes have been notified to leave Burlington and have done so.

Henry, Pittman, Daniel and Charles Guy. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. C. D. Hall, and the following brothers: W. A., of 71st; Charles, of Dunn; Anthony, of Flex Hill; Amos, of Gray's Creek, and George Guy, of Fayetteville.

The funeral services will take place from Mount Gilead church on Sunday morning at 10 o'clock.
