

CANALIZATION SCHEME.

Board of Army Engineers to Visit Fayetteville This Month. Maj. E. J. Hale has just received a long distance telephone message from Maj. Kuhn, of the United States Army Engineering Corps, in charge of the Norfolk and Wilmington harbors, saying that, at the request of the Rivers and Harbors Committee, a board of army engineers will arrive at Fayetteville at 9 o'clock on the 24th of January for the purpose of giving a hearing in the canalization scheme. The board will consist of Col. Hoxey, Maj. Winslow, and one other, accompanied by Maj. Kuhn. A formal notice from Maj. Kuhn will appear tomorrow.

Grand Lodge of Masons. The Grand Lodge of the Masonic order in North Carolina met in Raleigh on Tuesday night. Grand Master Winston presiding and making his annual address as follows: "He paid a glowing tribute to the other officers and made special mention of the district deputy masters. The great work being done by the Oxford Orphan asylum was endorsed. Grand Master Winston set forth fully the work being done in regard to the Masonic Temple. With \$50,000 of the first mortgage the subscriptions amount to \$139,671.17. Outside of the bonds, \$59,965.19 has been paid in. He urged continued work for subscriptions, and said it was very probable that the cornerstone of the Temple would be laid on St. John's day, the 24th of June. The occasion will be an event one in the history of the Masonic order in the State of North Carolina. "In the course of his address, Grand Master Winston referred to the growth of the Eastern Star in the State and the splendid work being done by the women who belong to it. "In conclusion he returned thanks for the honor conferred upon him and congratulated the order that at no time in its history had it been so prosperous. "The report of the Grand Treasurer, Leo D. Heatt, showed the balance on hand at the beginning of the year as \$4,411.00, receipts \$11,696.07, the balance on hand being \$4,647.07. "Report of Grand Secretary John C. Dreyer showed that on October 13, 1906, the number of Masons in North Carolina were 16,835, an increase of 1,307 during the year, and that there were 364 lodges, 14 of these acting under dispensation. "The report of the Oxford Orphan asylum showed 250 orphans being cared for, and that 20 more could now be taken. The agencies to it amount to \$5,629.39. The gross receipts for the year were \$8,440."

Industrial Club. The Industrial Club, with handsome quarters in the Lilly building on Hay street, is now fully organized, with Messrs. J. H. Anderson president, J. F. Harrison vice-president, J. B. Tillinghast secretary. Mr. Anderson is in Charlotte last week in the interest of the club. Its personnel embraces many of the most progressive business men of the city.

STATE COLORED NORMAL. Visit of the Local Managers—Testimonials Presented. From Friday Daily. Mr. H. L. Cook, Dr. H. W. Lilly and Mr. Q. K. Nimocks, local members of the board of directors of the State Colored Normal School of this city, visited the school today in a body, on a tour of inspection. The school was found to be in good condition, and doing effective work. All of the classes were visited during the recitation hour. Modern methods of teaching are employed, and the students showed proficiency in studies. The members of the board expressed themselves as favorably impressed with the character of the work being done by the school. During their visit, the faculty of the school took the visiting members of the board by surprise by presenting to Mr. H. L. Cook, the chairman, a gold headed cane; to Dr. Lilly, the treasurer, a silver mounted Waterman fountain pen, and to Mr. Q. K. Nimocks, a silver mounted silk umbrella, all suitably engraved, as a token of appreciation of their efforts in behalf of the school. The presentation was made by Prof. E. E. Smith, principal of the school, and the visiting members each made suitable acknowledgment.
