Make Levy then opened his knife, and made a lunge at Jenkins, and in doing so, stumbled and fell, the knife penetrating the calf of the leg of Will Ray, who was standing near Jenkins, and who bled to death in twenty minutes. Levy remained around while the boys were trying to stop the flow of blood, and then disappeared. (It will be remembered that

Levy appeared at the jall Sunday and surrendered himself.) Andrew Monroe, Frank Jenkins, Jas. Thomas, Sherrod Graham, John Cogdell and Henry Snipes all testified to


