RAEFORD'S PROPOSED NEW COUNTY OF GLENN.

What the Glenn County Club Expects.

We find the following editorial in the Red Springs Citizen, which will be interesting to our readers, as the proposed Glenn county takes a good slice of fine territory from Cumberland:

"From time to time, since the defeat of the Glenn county movement in the last legislature, we have heard of the Glenn County Club, organized by the citizens of Raeford for the purpose of forming a new county with the county seat at Raeford. Now, no one blames these good and hopeful people for their perseverance of a cause that means so much to Raeford."

"Our proposition is simply this: We do not object to any movement made by the people of Raeford for the formation of a new county, provided they leave off such portions of Robeson as will affect us either in our future business or political movements."

"We were shown this week a private letter written to one of our citizens which contained a card soliciting his aid and help. We publish below the contents of the card, without further comment:

Constitution Glenn County League. "We, the citizens living in Western Cumberland and Northern Robeson counties, North Carolina, far removed from our respective county seat and thereby experiencing great inconvenience and disadvantages, do for the relief of these conditions hereby organize the 'Glenn County League,' whose united membership earnestly appeal to the General Assembly that shall meet during 1909 to establish Glenn County as herein provided, and for the government and regulations of this League, we adopt the following constitution and by-laws:

"Section 1. The name of this organization shall be The Glenn County League.

"Sec. 2. The object of Glenn County League shall be the ultimate establishment of Glenn County out of parts of Cumberland and Robeson counties with the following boundaries:

"Commencing at a point on Lumber River at the extreme south boundary of Blue Springs township Robeson county in the lines between Robeson and Scotland counties, and follows said line nearly north with the present boundaries of Robeson and Cumberland counties to the Morganton road on the Moore county line; thence with the Morganton road to the point where said road crosses Little Rock fish stream; thence down Little Rock fish to Central plank road; thence a straight line to Davis' Bridge on Big Rockfish; thence due south to a point that would intercept a straight line (running from the old corner of Robeson and Cumberland, established in 1786, to Bethune's Bridge in Robeson county); thence a direct line to Bethune's Bridge in Robeson county; thence to Graham's Mill; thence a direct line almost west to the beginning.

"I have read the above and approve the same and hereby appeal to the General Assembly of 1909 to grant this petition.

THE TRIAL OF MAKE LEVY. His Case Made Bailable.

From Friday's Daily. Make Levy, a bright mulatto 19 years of age, was tried yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock before Squire C. P. Overby, charged with the murder of Will Ray on the Fourth of July.

Ex-Judge Sutton appeared for the defendant, while there was no one to represent the State.

The State presented a number of witnesses, all of whom testified to about the same effect.

Ben Snipes, the first witness, stated that after a big row at Rock Springs church, where a festival was in progress, a crowd of them went down the road a piece, and Frank Jenkins walked up and said: "Boys, don't let's have any more fuss," and started to walk back. Make Levy then opened his knife, and made a lunge at Jenkins, and in doing so, stumbled and fell, the knife penetrating the calf of the leg of Will Ray, who was standing near Jenkins, and who died to death in twenty minutes. Levy remained around while the boys were trying to stop the flow of blood, and then disappeared. (It will be remembered that Levy appeared at the jail Sunday and surrendered himself.)

Andrew Monroe, Frank Jenkins, Jas. Thomas, Sherrod Graham, John Coppell and Henry Snipes all testified to the same effect.

"They all agreed in saying that Ray and Levy were on a friendly terms at the time of the killing.

The Magistrate bound Levy over to the Superior Court in the sum of \$500, which he so far has failed to give, and he remains in jail.

State News of Interest.

Greenville gets the Eastern Carolina Teachers' Training School. Announcement was made after an all-day session of the State Board of Education Wednesday evening.

Later State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joyner said the Harrington site at Greenville was selected, this having forty-three acres, valued at \$8,800. Another Greenville site gives \$100,000 including bonds and sites, less the cost of the recent bond election which was about \$2,000.
