The crops are beginning to get grassy, too wet to plow and some of the farmers will have to lay by in the grass. The farmers are getting pretty blue over their crops. The cotton crop is four or five weeks behind time. I have not learned of a single bloom in this section. There are generally blooms in this section the middle of June. I think it will be about two weeks before many blooms will be seen. I think a half a crop of cotton for 1907 will be about the top. 1907 has been a tough year for the farmers.
