

MAD CAREER OF WILD HORSE.

Runs Through One Store and into Another.

From Thursday's Daily. Persons on Hay Street this morning about 10:30 o'clock were startled when they saw a horse dash at full speed from the front door of the store of Nimocks & Co., run across Hay Street directly towards Frank Thornton's store, then across to the left, but not in time to escape a tilt with the large plate glass window of Warren Prior & Sons.

The animal, with blood streaming from its head, continued its mad race up Hay Street, leaving this street near the A. C. L. depot and running for two miles southward, until it became entangled in a barbed-wire fence, which held it prisoner until its pursuers arrived on the scene.

The horse, which was the property of Mr. Thos. Barber, of Cumberland Mills, was hitched with a light wagon attached to it in the rear of Nimocks' store, and must have become frightened at something, for suddenly it broke loose from its moorings, dashed towards the rear of Nimocks's store, leaped into the door, leaving the wagon partially wrecked at this point, and ran clear through the store and on across Hay Street as above described. Though the store was packed with goods and cases, leaving only a narrow passage-way, the animal did not touch a thing in its journey through it.

When the animal was captured and brought back to Fayetteville it was found to have been severely hurt, the worst wound being a big crack in the skull. Its running into the window of Prior's store was probably due to the fact that the eye next to the window was blind.

The loss to Warren Prior & Sons is estimated at \$200.

South Carolinians Will Come to Cumberland Fair.

Several Fayetteville people attended the second meet of the Dillon Driving Club Thursday.

This meet was more successful than the first—the attendance was between three and four thousand.

The 2:40 class had eight starters and went as fast as 2:32.
