SENATOR NIMOCKS ON CUMBER LAND-MOORE FENCE LAW.

In answer to enquiries from citizen of Cumberland who reside contiguous to the Moore county line as to the status of the Moore county stock law, I wish to say through your columns that the law goes into effect the first day of April, 1909, as I recollect its

The law does NOT require the cour ty of Moore to build a line fence between adjoining counties, but provides that the county line shall be the "fence." This struck me as unjust to adjoining counties not under the stock law, and I did my best to amend the act in the Senate by introducing a supplemental bill requiring Moore county to build a good and sufficient fence along the county line between Cum erland and Moore, but the amenment was strongly opposed by both Senators Dockery and Peele, who represented Moore in the Senate, and by Mr. McDonald, representative from Moore in the House. I failed to get the amendment through on the first vote by 1 majority, the vote standing 16 to 17 and not content with this defeat, called the matter up later, renewed the fight for the amendment, and again lost it by a vote of 21 to 23, as the Senate journal will no doubt show. I asked Mr. Keith, our county commis sioner from Little River township, Mr. Blue, president of the Aberdeen & Rockfish Railroad, Hon. J. E. Buchan, former representative of Moore, and others, to see Mr. McDonald, and also saw him myself, and tried to induce him to consent to the amendment re quiring Moore to build the line fence but he would not do so, and so I could only make the best fight I could, and

let the result be as it might. Having taken the position I did on the question of a county stock law Observer during the sitting of the Legislature, I felt that both consistency and good faith required me to try and do all I could to compel Moore ounty to build a line fence between ore and Cumberland; this I tried to do earnestly, but unsuccessfully.
