WIFE.

From Wednesday's Daily.
Among the most interesting cases tried in this term is that of State vs. Albert Hales, a young colored boy about 15 years old from the east of the river, charged with shooting one Oliver Carter.
The defense was that Albert and two other boys went hunting one night in early November and the dogs struck a trail and ran for nearly a mile and when the boys came up the dogs were barking furiously and the boys thinking it was a bear, Albert shot in the direction where the bushes were shaking and the three imagining that a "bar" or some "varmint" was after them ran for home. Oliver it seems was sitting or lying behind a log and the shot entered the right arm between elbow and shoulder and part entered the leg.
The trial commenced yesterday and ended today in a verdict of "not guilty" the jury deliberating only five minutes.
A very simple relation of the trial and its incidents is to be found in the following poem written by Mr. Chas. G. Rose, a member of the bar during the progress of the trial. To understand its references it is as well to state that some of the witnesses testified that certain bushes were known as "Hurrh" bushes, and that a gum tree was one of the exhibits of the trial.

"In far away Cedar Creek,
Where the "Hurrh" bushes grow,
Three coons went out a fourth to seek,
In the moon-light's pleasant glow.

"The dogs they barked and the dogs they bayed,

A Number of Cases Disposed Of.

The following cases have been disposed of in the Superior Court since yesterday afternoon's issue of the Observer:
W. L. Peoples, a white horse trader of this city, was convicted today of fraud in a horse trade. Sentence not yet pronounced. The jury in this case was: D. E. Mims, Heman Jones, E. Hall, G. J. Chason, J. H. Smith, W. F. McLaurin, Malcolm McFarland, B. Hales, D. D. Carter, W. M. Jessup, J. D. Williams and N. M. Downing.
P. L. Dixon, fraud, not guilty; Lee Green, retailing defendant plead guilty, defendant recognized in the sum of \$100 for appearance at August term.
Maggie Robinson, Eliza Canady, affray, both guilty, not yet sentenced.
John Bennett, larceny, plead guilty, not yet sentenced.
John Wilson, assault with deadly weapon, guilty, sentenced to 12 months on roads.
Lionie Long, Herbert Long, Doug las Hair, assault and battery, plead guilty and fined \$15 each and one-third the costs.
Charles Faircloth, attempt to burn guard house at Hope Mills, plead guilty, saying that he was so drunk at the time that he did not know what he was doing. Not yet sentenced.
J. D. Shaw, assault with deadly weapon, plead guilty and judgment suspended on payment of costs.

The following cases have been disposed of in the Superior Court since yesterday afternoon:
P. L. Dixon, fraud, verdict not guilty; Nora Herring, disorderly house, not guilty; Willis McGee, larceny, guilty and sentenced to 12 months on roads. Crossy Williams, retailing, guilty and sentenced to six months in State prison; J. D. Shaw, A. A. Buchan, assault, plead guilty and judgment suspended on payment of costs by first named; W. G. Purnell, assault with a deadly weapon, plead guilty and fined \$20 and costs; John Wilson, assault with a deadly weapon, guilty, 12 months on roads; Walter Robinson, retailing, guilty, six months on roads; Charles Faircloth, assault with deadly weapon, plead guilty, sixty days in jail; same on his plea of guilty of attempt to burn guard house at Hope Mills, judgment suspended; Fred McCallum, assault with deadly weapon, guilty, 4 months on roads; W. B. Coats and R. J. Hair, affray, Coats fined \$15 and 12 months on roads, Hair \$10 and 12 months on roads; Ed Carroll, vagrancy, not guilty.

The court is now occupied with the trial of the case of A. Perry for violating town ordinance an appeal from the mayor's decision, that he could not sell foreign fish outside of the market house.
The last case placed on the docket, that of Robert Hadley for escape from chain gang, making 154 cases in all.
Including the bills returned by the grand jury at this term, the docket contained 154 cases. Up to last night Solicitor Sinclair had disposed of 64 cases. This means getting 64 cases off the docket in three and one-half days, as the docket was not called until 2:30 p. m. Monday, owing to the Judge missing his railroad connection at Maston Sunday evening.

HUNTING WILD CATTLE IN CUMBERLAND.
An Exciting Sport.

Wild cattle in Cumberland—and a hundred head or more! It's hard to believe, isn't it? But it's so, nevertheless.
The writer was much astonished, as the reader will be, to learn that for the past several days a hunt for wild cattle, more dangerous and exciting (because not made to order) than Teddy's hunt for canned loons, elephants, etc., in the African woods, has been in progress within ten miles of Fayetteville.
A number of years ago Maj. J. B. Broadfoot turned several cows loose on a stretch of land he owns between Carver's Creek and Cross Creek. There they have ever since, multiplying and growing wilder with each generation, until now the herd numbers fully one hundred, all wild as zebras.
These animals ranged for a distance of seven miles between two creeks, and along their banks ten or twelve miles.
Finding it almost impossible to catch any of them and hearing that certain parties were hunting them with rifles, Maj. Broadfoot decided to take a hand in the matter himself, and enlisted the services of Mr. J. A. Ratcliffe, one of the crack rifle shots of the F. I. L. I. So for the past several days, accompanied by a pilot, a man in the neighborhood who knows the wild cattle and their range, Mr. Ratcliffe has been having more real sport than Mr. Roosevelt is having in Africa. So far he has been able to get within rifle range of six of the animals and he has brought them all to the ground. One of them a great bull, after being shot twice, made a dash for Mr. Ratcliffe and it took three more bullets in the head before the animal dropped at the hunter's feet.
The pilot, Sam Elliott estimates the number of these wild animals at one hundred, having himself seen as many as seventy-five different ones.
Mr. Ratcliffe will continue his exciting hunt until he has bagged the whole outfit.
