FAYETTEVILLE THE IDEAL CITY.

A Prominent Lawyer of the State Struck By Its Beauty and Possibilities.

R. F. Gray, Esq., of Raleigh, and one of the most prominent lawyers of the State, is in the city on legal business.

Though Mr. Gray had been to Fayetteville hundreds of times before, this having been the home of his wife, Mr. Gray had not been here since the streets were paved, and he says that when he stepped from the train the other night, and looked up Hay street, he was astonished at the transformation.

Last night as he lay in bed at the Lafayette, he saw Massey's Hill on which is built the Holt-Morgan, Victory and Tolar-Hart-Holt mills, and Ashley Heights, where the silk mills are located, with their hundreds of electric lights; and this morning he drove over the splendid new macadam road over the famous residential hill, Haymount, and looking to the right as he went he saw Harrington Hill, teaming with life and dotted with hundreds of new houses, which will some day rival Haymount as a place of residence, he said never before was he so struck with the location of Fayetteville situated in the midst of this amphitheatre of hills, south, west, and north, and bounded on the east by that noble stream, the Cape Fear. "It is beautiful, magnificent, wonderful," he said.

"When the scheme for the canalization of the Cape Fear river is consummated Fayetteville will within a reasonably short time take front rank among the cities of the South."

State Farmers' Convention.

At the A. & M. College, West Raleigh, N. C., commencing Tuesday, Aug. 24th, and continuing to Friday, Aug. 27th, there will be four days of real study in agriculture, horticulture, dairying, stock judging, etc. At the same time and place there will be held a woman's convention where competent women will discuss their problems in home making, housekeeping, prevention of disease, cooking, etc.

In addition to men from our own State, they have invited speakers for the occasion from the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., and from other States.
President Hill of the A. & M. College offers board at 25 cents a meal and room rent free. Each person should bring one sheet and one pillowcase. Let the farmers of the State with their wives and daughters attend. A fine programme—practical questions discussed by practical farmers—has been arranged.

Three Bales To the Acre.

Mr. Jeff Sessoms, of Stedman, was among the visitors in Fayetteville today. When asked about his farm, of which so much has been written lately, Mr. Sessoms said the reports were not exaggerated, especially as to his cotton. He has several acres which he expects to yield three bales to the acre, if not more. He has used the best kind of fertilizers, with a good quantity of saw dust. The saw dust is about 15 years old, and the government estimates its value at \$2.20 a ton. Who would have thought of rating three bales to the acre, and that partly with saw dust, five years ago? The progress of agriculture in Cumberland in the past five years has been wonderful, and it is such men as Mr. Sessoms and other scientific farmers, who have been potent factors in this result.
