Building Good Roads by Townships

While Cumberland County has made good progress in the building of roads by the convict forces, the following method is the best way to get permanent roads every where and is an example that could be followed with profit by Cumberland and every county in the State that has not already done so: The people of Jonesboro township, Lee county, at an election Saturday voted for a bond issue of \$1,500 for good roads. This is the second election held for this purpose in Jonesboro township, only a few months ago one was held, but the people were not so well informed and failed to come to the polls. The people who knew the advantages of good roads were not satisfied with results and petitioned the county commissioners for a second trial, and now they are jubilant over their victory, and, too, because theirs is the first township in the new county of Lee to take this forward step.

ANNUAL MEETING OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY.

Successor to the Late Judge MacRae Elected.

The Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina, in Raleigh Wednesday afternoon held the regular annual meeting, the session lasting from one to four o'clock.

Besides the election of Lucius Polk McGeebe to be Dean of the University Law School and chief professor of that department, the following business was transacted.

Governor Kitchin presided at the meeting and Maj. R. H. Battle, one of the trustees and the regular secretary to the board for some years, performed the duties of the secretary.

A committee of three on visitation was appointed to make its report at the next commencement of the university.

The meeting of the trustees will hereafter be held on Monday of commencement week.

The annual sermon will be delivered on Sunday, and Tuesday (instead of Wednesday) will be "Commencement Day" proper. By this arrangement three consecutive days will be covered. Heretofore Monday was an "off-day" with little or nothing doing. The class meetings will also be held on Monday this year.

Sketch of the New Dean.

Lucius Polk McGeebe was born in Person county, North Carolina, forty two years ago. He was one of three sons of the late Hon. Monford McGeebe (at one time State Commissioner of Agriculture and a prominent citizen) and Sallie Badger McGeebe, his mother, being a daughter of one of North Carolina's most distinguished public men, Hon. George Badger, judge, United States Senator and secretary of the navy. The fact that he comes of good stock is accentuated again by the reminder that he is a cousin of President James K. Polk.

Mr. Harry Carver Dead.

A telegram was received here Friday afternoon announcing the death in Charlotte that day of Mr. Harry Carver an old Fayetteville boy, and that the remains will arrive here on the Bennettsville train Saturday morning. The body was taken from the train to the old Gee cemetery two miles west of town where the funeral services and interment took place.

MORE WEALTHY MEN INTERESTED IN THIS COUNTY

Cumberland the Garden Spot of America. That Cumberland county is beginning to be looked upon as the garden spot of this continent, there is no doubt, recent developments all pointing to this fact. In the past few years a number of wealthy people, and many that are not wealthy, from various sections of the country, have come here prospecting, and few of them have not remained. The above is no ancient history, but the facts were recalled by the visit here last week of Mr. Ashton Lee of Massachusetts, and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wilson, of South Dakota. Mr. Lee and Mr. Wilson are men of large means, and have about closed negotiations for 10,000 acres of land in northwestern Cumberland, adjoining the property of the Crostan and Backhouse estates which are owned by rich and prominent Northern and Southern people.

Mr. Wilson, who is a Scotchman, has been in South Dakota, for eight or ten years, and during that time he has placed colonies of Scotch and Germans in various sections of that State. He says he has witnessed the rigors of the climate there long enough and is desirous to come south and settle.

Though he does not yet know whether he will make Cumberland his home, the present plans of him and Mr. Lee being to make a purchase of the ten thousand acres they are to purchase here; he is very favorably impressed with the idea of locating here permanently.

Both gentlemen will certainly receive a warm welcome to Fayetteville and Cumberland.

THE HOUSE FOR THE FIRST TIME RECOGNIZES UPPER CAPE FEAR PROJECT

The Senate Will Now No Doubt Add The Proper Appropriation.

A draft of the report which the Rivers and Harbors Committee will submit to the House has been made public. As will be seen by the items published below, the project for the canalization of the Cape Fear above Wilmington, is recognized, and an appropriation of \$10,000 for the purchase of sites for locks and dams, is recommended. This item is necessitated by the fact that the change in the scheme of canalization from three locks to two locks as recommended by the last visiting Board of Engineers, requires the purchase of sites other than the ones previously purchased.

The House of Representatives has never before taken the initiative in recognition of the Upper Cape Fear project. It has been the Senate that added the project to the Rivers and Harbors bill after it came from the House.

Senator Simmons has given his positive assurance that the appropriation that the engineers recommend for the canalization will be added by the Senate, and made by Congress in its entirety. He says the project is of such tremendous importance to the State, which is losing over \$3,600,000 annually by the delay, that it must go through at this session.

Washington correspondence of the Raleigh News and Observer: "The Rivers and Harbors bill as agreed upon by the House committee, gives the usual appropriations for maintenance of work already undertaken in North Carolina and recognizes several new projects, but does not include substantial for the big water development schemes projected for the State. There was ample reason for this non-action by the House powers that be.

The thirty foot channel for Wilmington also failed to receive recognition in the bill because the report on the project authorized by the last Congress has not yet been completed. However, a two hundred thousand dollar appropriation for continuation of the present work of maintenance at and below Wilmington is provided, the project for an eight foot channel between Wilmington and Fayetteville is recognized, in the bill to the extent of a ten thousand dollar appropriation for the purchase of sites for two locks and dams. This action by the committee is highly pleasing to Representative Godwin, who says it commits the House to the Upper Cape Fear project which will require the expenditure of \$615,000 to secure the eight foot channel.

Senator Simmons, by virtue of his position on the Senate Committee on Commerce, will be able to provide to us even greater degree for North Carolina's river and harbor projects when the bill goes over to the Senate.

The following are the two Cape Fear items:

"Improving Cape Fear river, above Wilmington—continuing improvement with a view to securing a navigable depth of eight feet up to Fayetteville including surveys and acquisition of and for sites for locks and dams and completion of plans for the same in accordance with the report submitted to the sixtieth Congress, first session, \$10,000.

Improving Cape Fear river at and below Wilmington—continuing improvements to such depth in excess of twenty feet as the appropriations for work may permit, due regard being given to the difference in tidal oscillation at the upper and lower portion of the improvement, \$200,000.

Out of a total appropriation of \$400,000, North Carolina is entitled to \$2,000,000, and only gets some \$200,000 from the House, \$200,000 of this being the usual appropriation made in each bill for the work of dredging the Cape Fear below Wilmington. Senator Simmons, will undoubtedly see that our State gets its just share of recognition.






