K." flour is the best, as white as snow, and is made of the very best prime white Baltimore wheat, Mr. Troy is very careful of this brand, and allows no article to go out which could do discredit to it. His next grade is superfine-somewhat inferior to the "O, K.", but is still equal to the best Northern family. We have been using some of this quality in our own family, made from wheat raised by Mr. J. W. Powers of this ender. At the time of our visit, Mr. Troy was shipping flour to Wilmington, Raleigh, and South Carolina. The definand for the "O. K." is now

very good, and is daily increasing. WOL CARDING DEPARTMENT. On the second floor of the building are his wool carding machines, consisting of a Breaker, which takes the wool, picks it out, and throws it off, and a Finisher, where the article is finely carded and thrown out in beautiful rolls ready for use. Mr. Troy's son Willie is "boss" of this establishment, and, though but a lad, is very active and attentive to busines. He keeps his books methodically and accurately, and, in all the countless orders received there, he has never made a mistake-quite a creditable record. Hundreds of packages of wool were piled here and there, to be carded and rolled. THE CORN MILLS


