days after the Fair will be considered forfeited, and will not be paid. Awarding Committees are requested to meet at 2 P. M., on Thursday, at the Secretary's office. Persons appointed on Committees are expected to serve, as the busi-

Tuesday, Nov. 16th, and will close on Fri-The gates will open each day at 8 o'clock, A. M., and at that time every em-

ployee is required to be at his post.

The Chief Marshal and his Aids will have charge of the Fair Grounds, and will preserve order and enforce the rules and regulations of the Society, and such other rules and regulations as may be adopted for the government of the Fair. A well regulated police, under the control of the Chief Marshal, will be on the grounds to aid in maintaining order. The police will be under the control of the Chief Marshal or General Superintendent, but in case of an emergency will obey an order from the President, Secretary or any member of the

The Society has a right to eject by force from the Fair Grounds, without writ, warrant or notice, any person disturbing its

good order or decorum. Drunkenness, gambling, quarreling, loud talking, cursing, obscene language, and the like, are offensive, for which ejection Awarding Committee .- W. D. Gaster, from the grounds will be summarily enforced.

> The Executive Committee will employ a sufficient guard to take charge of the Grounds during the night.
