It takes in the parks, squares, churches, places, gardens, palaces, columns, fountains, boulevards, streets, statues, the river and the quays with all their life. And yet, west from the Arc, leading west to the town of Euclie, is the great Avenue. Then on rour right and left are the great boulevarie, situated outside the inner walk view is for many miles-yes, from twenty to thirty miles in every direction, and not anything obscured, but one vast expanse of open squares, boulevards, avenues, groves, parks, gardens, palaces, churches and theatres.
