Erection to Begin on Fifth Avenue in Fall; Leased for Two Years; Popular as Hotel Keeper.

Mrs. A. M. Gover, whose reputation as a popular hotel manageress is highly enviable, having reached a very high stage of popularity while she owned and managed the Kentucky Home, has decided to re-engage in the hotel business and announces her plans for a 50-room brick modern structure on Fifth avenue between Church and Main streets.

Mrs. Gover has purchased from George Stephens the green house facing on Sixth avenue and contemplates moving her residence on Fifth and Church to Sixth so as to provide ample room for the hotel. The plans call for a hotel that is strictly modern with steam heat, running water in each room with baths for connection with each room.

Mrs. Gover informs The NEWS that she has leased the hotel for two years to a popular and well-known hotel keeper and that after the expiration of this period she expects to assume the management.

Mrs. Gover will conduct the restaurant feature of the Chimney Rock Company enterprise this summer and upon her return from that work expects to begin the erection of the hotel.

The Stephens cottage is being repainted and improved otherwise and will be occupied this summer by a lady from Sumter, S. C.

## MR. WOOTEN BUYS THE CAROLINA TERRACE HOTEL

Will be Operated Under Same Popular Plans of Kentucky Home, Which Is to be Enlarged.

E. B. Wooten, who since his purchase of the Kentucky Home has made a signal success of the hotel business in Hendersonville, has purchased from Howell Cobb the Carolina Terrace at a price around \$50,000.

It is Mr. Wooten's intention to open his new hotel in June. E. B. Wooten will be in active charge and his son, J. C. Wooten, will continue with the management of the Kentucky Home. The Carolina Terrace will be operated only as a summer hotel. The style of management that has made the Kentucky Home singularly popular will be employed at the Carolina Terrace.

Mr. Cobb, who is in the hotel business in Raleigh, was prompted to sell his Hendersonville property which he bought and highly improved with a big expenditure about three years ago, by reason of the absence of his son, Arthur Cobb, in service in France, who was manager of the hotel here.

The popularity of the Kentucky Home calls for additional room and in order to take care of the patronage an addition of 40 rooms on the west side is contemplated, each room to have running water and private bath.
