HOLTON NOT TO PROSECUTE. DOOR GLOSED TO BLACKBURN.

Judge Lunsford, of Virginia Will The Indited Congressman is no Conduct Case of Representative Blackburn at Greensboro.

Washington, D. C., March 27.-Judge Lunsford L. Lewis, United States District Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, will, in all probability, conduct the government case at the trial of Representative Blackburn, fifteen days jury. hence in Greensboro. The selection of the prosecuting attorney will not be announced for several days, but the information comes pretty straight that Judge Lewis has been selected as the most available prosecutor from the names of a half dozen district attorneys who have been considered.

Judge Lewis was the Republican nominee for Governor against Claude Swanson, having resigned the district attorneyship to make the race, and was reappointed after the election. He is a man of ability and is regarded as a strong prosecutor by the Department of Justice. He is hardly as aggressive as Holton, but it is said for him that he fights his legal battles to a finish.

It is possible that an attorney from the Department of Justice will also take a hand in the prosecution, though the present arrangement is to place the government's case in Judge L. wis' bands. Mr. Holton will be on hand and will give the government attorneys the benefit of his counsel and advice.

The selection of a non-resident attorney to prosecute Blackburn is significant in that it shows that the government is behind the case and not District Attorney

The Boyd letter to Judge Pritchard, in which the former Assistant Attorney General of the Department of Justice advised that there was no violation of law in a congressman practicing before a department of the government, is to be sprung on the public shortly. It is said that Judge Boyd had a copy of the letter with him when here several days since. The letter purports to be dated Salisbury and not Washington.-T. J. Pence, in News & Observer.

IT SHALL NOT GO BEGGING.

Prof. J. J. Britt Would Take Republicam Nomination for Congress.

Assistant District Attorney J. J. Britt said today that the published statement to the effect that he had declined to be a candidate for the republican congressional nomination in the tenth district this year was an error. Mr. Britt said that he had not authorized such a statement. Asked if this meant he would be a candidate, the assistant district attorney said that he had not fully determined his course but that in all probability his name would be presented to the nominating convention.

If Mr. Britt desires the nomination there is little in the way of his securing May by paying an additional 50 cents the coveted honor. He is practically the only available candidate thus far who has so much as considered the nomination. Mr. Britt has many friends in western North Carolina who have interested themselves in his benaif and who desire to secure for the Asheville man the nomination.

There is a wide difference of opinion among the rank and file of the party relative to the chances of the republicans have of carrying the district this year. There are no few who believe or profess to believe, that the factions will get together before the day of election and give loyal support to the nominee. Others declare that there is no such thing as the factions getting together; that the breach is too wide to be closed, and that he who accepts the congressional nomination is doomed to defeat. Longer Recognized at the White House.

The Washington Correspondent of the Raleigh News and Observer has this:

There is no longer any doubt of the fact that the administration has denied Representative Blackburn the privilege of dispensing patronage in his district by reason of his indictment by a Federal grand

This action on the part of the administration in taking from the congressman from the eighth District his most valuable prerogative was perhaps responsible for his absence from the house today when the insurgents were making a desperate effort to concur in the se ate amendments, so as to defeat finally point statehood for Arizona and New Mexico.

The absence of the North Carolina Congressman was noticeable for the reason that he voted with the administration when the statehood bill was originally before the house in return for two appointments given him by the president, namely, the Greensboro and Goldsboro postmastership. Since then Mr. Roosevelt has turned on Mr. Blackburn, who evidently did not consider that he was under further obligation to support administration measures.

There were a number of anxious inquirries for M1. Blackburn while the vote was being taken, but he did not show up at the capitol during the day.

It is said that Mr. Blackburn will make no further recommendations for the distribution of patrobage, realizing as he does that all administration influences are against him. His first recommendation after his indictment was that of Postmaster Ramsay for reappointment at Salisbury. It has been ignored entirely. In the case of Postmaster Loug, of Statesville, he did make a recommendation, but State Chairman Rollins pulled that official through with his O.K.
