### Then Tommy Rollins is Heard From-Cat and Parrot Time In Republican Ranks.

(Gazette News.)

Hon. C. J. Harris of Dillsboro, who returned from Washington a few days ago. was in Asheville yesterday, and was asked by the Gazette-News what he thought was the cause of Mr. Harkins's removal from the office of collector, and the appointment of George H. Brown of Statesville.

"It means simply a recognition of Mr. Blackburn as the only republican congressman from the state," he said. "My feelings toward Mr. Harkins are, and have always been, of the kindest," he replied, "Against his personality I have nothing whatever to say. My opposition to third-term appointments is well known, and is in line with the expressed will of the rank and file of the party. In essence, that expression covers Mr. Harkkins' case. I think he has had the office long enough."

"What about your candidacy for state

"I wish a change made. I wish to see the control of the party in the hands of someone not indentified with the ring. is absolutely necessary, if the party is to make progress. 'It is well known fact that Mr. Harris is simply running for chairman in the interest of Mr. Blackburn, and the republicans of Western North Carolina are not going to be fooled and deceived by his false and slanderous interviews.

"It seems that Mr. Harris and Mr. Blackburn are conducting their campaigns upon misrepresentations and are undertaking to unduly prejudice the minds of the people in every way possible against Judge Adams and the state organization, but I want to assure them that he cannot circulate slanderous interviews without being held accountable for the same by the re publican party in North Carolina.
