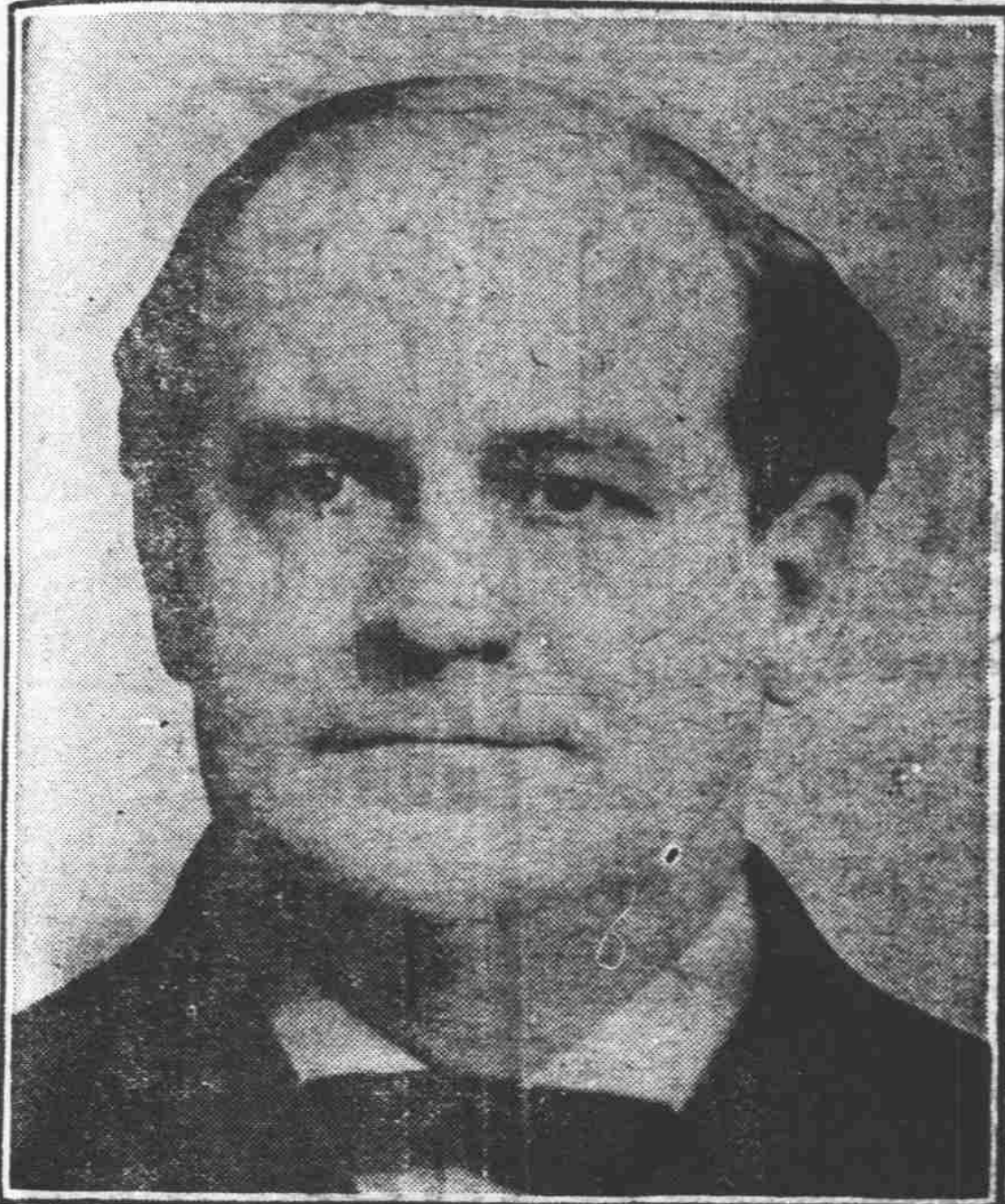

The following two letters explain themselves. The spirit of courtesy and hospitality shown in Mr. W. A. Smith's letter is characteristic of him and of Hendersonville:

Dear Sir:--I wrote Mr. John A. Law, President of the Saxon Mills, Spartanburg, S. C., with regard to arrangements which he made for an excursion for his operatives to Hendersonville. He writes me of your kindness to them, and I will be pleased to know if you will extend the same courtesies to our people, the Monarch Cotton Mills, Union S. C., if we can make general arrangements; that is, if you will give us the use of your grounds at Laurel Park without charge and take the excursionists to the park on your dummy line without charge, fare returning to be collected. We can say that we have as good a class of operatives as any mill in this section.
