#### Spanish---Moroccan War.

Barcelona, Spain.—Protesting against the war with Morocco serious riots have resulted and police officers are unable to quell disturbances. Innocent pedestrians suffer on account of strikers' conduct. Spanish losses at various points reported four hundred killed and wounded.

#### Alienists Say Thaw Is Sane.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y.—The hearing of Harry K. Thaw's application for release from Matteawan asylum was resumed and nearly all witnesses testified to the sanity of defendant. District Attorney Jerome was present and assumed entire control of the case. He chatted frequently with Thaw and the two appeared on the best of terms. Alien specialists declare Thaw is sane.

#### Rev. Len G. Broughton is Denounced.

Atlanta, Ga.—Representative Anderson, of Savannah, speaking to the question of personal privilege in the House of Representatives, denounces Rev. Len G. Broughton as a willful, malicious, reckless, malignant and vicious liar and his statements were endorsed by Rev. J. A. Slade, a Baptist minister from Muskogee county. Mr. Broughton stated in a sermon that Anderson's fight on the near-beer bill is prompted by personal interests in a Savannah brewery obtained since prohibition became effective. Anderson denied this saying he bought the stock fifteen years ago. In reply Mr. Broughton says time of the purchase is immaterial and that Anderson's own admission lines him up with the liquor interests.

### To Pave Side Streets

A petition is now being circulated and generally signed asking the town commissioners to lay four foot cement walks on all side streets in town.

It is proposed to give property owners ten years in which to pay for the improvement.

Fifty feet of concrete walk will cost but \$29.00, and this is payable at the rate of \$2.90 per year.

### Printing Contract Divided

RALEIGH, N. C.—Commissioner of Labor and Printing M. L. Shipman announced to day that E. M. Uzzell and company and Edwards & Broughton Co. joint bidders for the biennial contract for the state printing have accepted the counter proposition of the state printing commission and the state printing will be divided as nearly equal between these two printing houses as is practicable in conforming to the wishes and preferences of the various state departments. The counter proposition just accepted is on the basis of the former contract with the Uzzell company except for a reduction in the rate for quarter binding.
