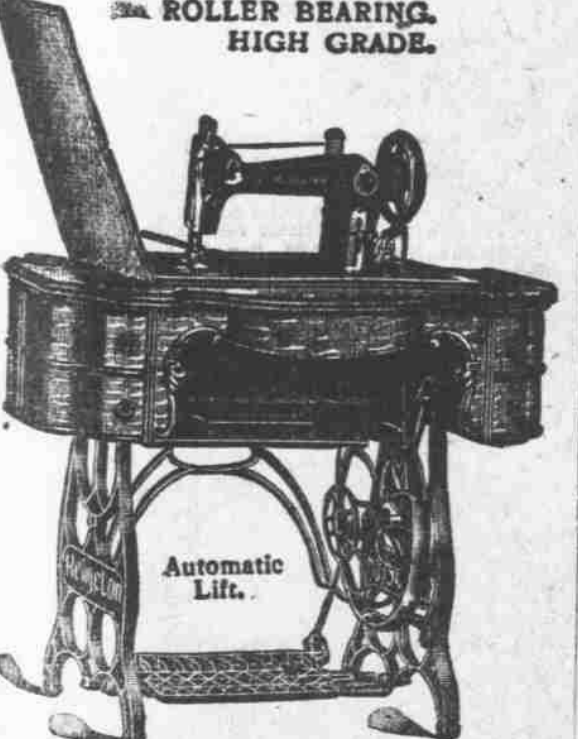

Good Road Meeting For Hendersonville.

Prof. Joseph Hyde Pratt, State Geologist and Secretary of the North Carolina Good Roads Association, will speak in this city Monday, August 23, at the county court house.

His subject will be in the interest of the good road movement and promises to be a timely one, as everybody is now more or less interested in the betterment of North Carolina mountain roads.

Professor Pratt is also a practical engineer in the economic survey of good roads.

Prof. Pratt is making a tour of the state preliminary to the great Good Road Convention to be held in the city of Asheville on October 6 and 7. Each county in the state is expected to elect delegates to this convention and great results are looked forward to from this meeting.

The local county commissioners are very busy distributing circulars about this meeting next Monday and it is hoped that quite a number of the city and county citizens will attend the meeting and give Professor Pratt a rousing reception.

Mr. F. E. Durfee Home.

Mr. F. E. Durfee, president of the Citizen's Bank, has returned from a three week's stay in Michigan, called there by the serious illness of his wife.

Mrs. Durfee's many friends here will be delighted to learn she is convalescent and will return home to Hendersonville in less than a month.

Mr. Durfee arrived in town this morning and says it seems good to get home. He remarked on the vast number of tourists here and says no resort he has visited in the North can show anything like the crowd now in Hendersonville.

Mr. Durfee believes business conditions in the South to be somewhat better than those prevailing in the North, and looks for a long period of continued prosperity. The crops in the immediate section from which he has just returned are somewhat below the average, lack of rain causing severe damage.

N. O. Famsler, of Chattanooga, who sold Henry Jordan the cement for the sidewalks, was in town Saturday. Mr. Famsler comments on the fact that most all Southern cities are making improvements these days on a scale unthought of a few years ago.
