The people of Hendersonville need to have their attention called to the fact that their school interests need some immediate attention. The building is not what it should be. While the walls and roof are good, the interior needs to be all taken out and replaced by a modern plan, so arranged that each grade can have a separate room. Fire escapes so necessary to be provided in all school buildings, must be put in, and provision made for the small children to be kept on the first floor.
