\$70,000 For New Postoffice

Mr. Joseph W. Hoke, Montgomery Capitalist, Pays \$26,000 For Famous Flat Rock Property. Superb Buildings, New Concrete Dam. Nearly \$100,000 to Be Expended On Improvements. Ewbank & Ewbank Negotiate big Deal.

The Rhett property, Flat Rock, comprising 240 acres, including the 80-acre lake, has been sold to Mr. Joseph W. Hoke, the Montgomery, Ala., capitalist, for \$26,000. Ewbank & Ewbank, real estate dealers negotiated and closed the deal.

Over \$75,000 will be spent on the property, which will be developed as an exclusive club resort, the membership of which will be composed almost entirely of Montgomery people prominent in the social and business worlds of the South.

Architects and landscape engi-

neers have gone over the property with Mr. Hoke. Their report and recommendations will be made to him later, but it is already definitely settled that not less than \$75,000 will be spent in making this historic old place a club resort second to none in the South.

Work on the buildings and grounds will commence late this year.

Mr. Hoke who has been stopping at the Gates Hotel, is delighted with the superb mountain scenery around Hendersonville.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Hayne are spending possibly \$100,000 on their recently acquired property here.

Mr. Hoke will make an initial expenditure of a like amount, almost.
