**SOME OF BENEFITS OF THE WHOLE-TIME HEALTH WORK CITY HEALTH OFFICER MAKES FIRST REPORT ON DAIRIES.**

February Report on Conduct of Dairies is First Issued in Campaign for Sanitation and Health.

Dr. J. Frank Cranford, city health officer, makes the following report for February on his findings of the dairies, this being the first report issued since the campaign for sanitation and health was recently inaugurated:

Wyanoak dairy, bacteria, 59000; butter fat, 4.2; specific gravity, 1.031; total solids, 12.11.

Coburn dairy, bacteria, 61000; butter fat, 4.4; specific gravity, 1.033; total solids, 13.01.

Barrows dairy, bacteria 67000; butter fat, 4.6; specific gravity, 1.033; total solids, 13.32.

Britton dairy, bacteria, 69000; butter fat, 4.6; specific gravity, 1.032; total solids, 12.96.

McPheeters dairy, bacteria, 70000; butter fat, 4; specific gravity, 1.032; total solids, 12.28.

The bacteriologist count by which the dairies are graded are averages of several samples taken during the month and indicate the relative care used to keep milk clean. An average count of over 50,000 per unit would indicate careless methods:

Butter fat (legal minimum 3.25); specific gravity (legal minimum 1.029). Total solids (legal minimum 11.75).

Samples below standard would indicate adulteration. Wash your bottles and help your dairymen have clean milk.

**DR. R. A. CHILD DEAD.**

Prominent in Legal, Political, Educational and Religious Circles.  
Dr. R. A. Child, formerly prominent in South Carolina legal, political, educational and religious circles and until a short while ago actively engaged in college work, died at his Hendersonville home Wednesday from the hardening of arteries.  
Funeral services were conducted Friday from the Hendersonville Methodist church with Dr. John O. Wilson, president of Lander college at Greenwood, S. C., officiating, assisted by Rev. W. F. Womble, pastor of the local church. Interment was made in Oakdale cemetery. The pall bearers were J. M. Rhodes, J. F. Brooks, J. D. Pullin, S. Maxwell, C. S. Fullbright, and W. H. Justus.

**An Interesting Career.**  
Dr. Child's career was interesting and marked by many promotions in the professions of law and ministry, his last service being in the effort to raise an endowment for Weaver college to abandon nearly a year ago, on account of failing health, which resulted in his death in his sixty-fifth year.  
Dr. Child was born at Old Cambridge, S. C., being the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Child. He was educated at the College of Richmond, Richmond, Va., later marrying Miss Essie Holcombe. From this marriage four children are living: Earle Child, Mrs. Dr. H. K. Boyd and Miss Minnie Child of Whitmore, S. C., and Mrs. A. E. Sawyer of Miami, Fla. From his second marriage the following children are living in Hendersonville, Misses, Ruth, Helen and Bessie Child, their mother being Miss Maggie Roper of Clio, S. C. before her marriage.

**Prominent in Politics.**  
After graduating from Richmond College Dr. Child practiced law for some time in Greenville and Pickens, S. C., being a partner of Colonel Holcombe, father of his first wife, and at Pickens. Dr. Child, rose rapidly in his legal profession and commanded a wide practice, his strongest forte being of a defender at the bar.  
During the practice of law and when about twenty-two years old Dr. Child was elected to the South Carolina legislature. About this time he was also editor of the county newspaper at Pickens and later was named by Gov. John P. Richardson as head of the chief executive's staff.

**Enters the Ministry.**  
Shortly after his conversion Dr. Child prepared for the ministry and in 1889 joined the Methodist conference of South Carolina. He found rapid promotion in the ministry, serving seven years on stations, six on districts and three on circuits. For seven years he was financial agent of Wofford college at Spartanburg, of which he was trustee and he held the position of financial agent with Lander college at Greenwood, S. C., for two years. Something more than a year ago he undertook to raise an endowment for Weaver college but had to resign on account of failing health after raising several thousand dollars.

**High Church Honors.**  
In 1902 Dr. Child went as a delegate from the the South Carolina conference to the general conference in Dallas, Tex., and in 1906 went to the Birmingham conference in the same capacity. Probably the greatest honor coming to Dr. Child during his useful career was that of being a member of the book committee of the Southern Methodist church from 1899 to 1914, in which capacity he and his fellow-committeemen had general oversight of the publishing department of Southern Methodism.

The degree of doctor of divinity was conferred upon Dr. Child by Erskine college at Bus West, S. C., in 1908. Covering a period of about twelve months Dr. Child was president of the Peoples National bank of Hendersonville, and in 1909 was elected to the office of mayor of Hendersonville. Dr. Child and family moved to Hendersonville about seven years ago. Mrs. Child and children will continue their residence in Hendersonville.

**SAND-CLAY CONTROVERSY ENDS.**

S. H. Huggins Dismisses Matter With Brief Interview; Visits Florida.  
The triangular sand-clay road controversy has served its purpose and terminated itself with a brief statement from S. H. Huggins in reply to the article in last week's Democrat from Road Supervisor P. F. Patton.

Mr. Huggins left Saturday with his little daughter, Mary Ella, for Tampa, St. Petersburg and other points in Florida.  
A representative of the Democrat saw Mr. Huggins before his departure and asked him if he was going to reply to Mr. Patton's article, to which he answered:  
"I do not think it necessary for me to say anything further on the subject of roads now. A re-reading of my last article will answer most of Mr. Patton's article. I will say however that the Edneyville road was thorough ganded two years ago last fall, and I will leave it to the public to say who has misstated the facts."  
With reference to cement roads, Mr. Huggins said:  
"I suppose Mr. Patton refers to cement roads, which I have seen many miles of at different times and places, Jacksonville, New Orleans, Chattanooga, Knoxville and other places, and if I am not mistaken in what I have seen, if Mr. Patton will go to Charlotte, N. C., he will find some there."
