The association decided to make a proposition to the Greater Hendersonville club in the way of offering of co-operation in the employment of a whole-time secretary to serve both organizations.

Glazener were guests of the association and Dr. Hunter had his name added to the membership list after enjoying the discussion of some of the many problems in which the business men are interested. He had on that day opened the hot service department of his soda fountain business, so served those present to complimentary hot drinks.

Interest in the association somewhat diminished during the summer rush therefore before the next meeting a committee will work up the attendance and begin a campaign for new members.

## THIRTEEN CASES DIPHTHERIA.

School Children Are Examined Daily to Prevent Spread of Disease.

Thirteen cases of diphtheria have developed in Hendersonville. The spread of the trouble made it necessary to take extra precaution as a result of which daily examination of the school children is made by Dr. J. Frank Cranford, city health officer. Children with throats appearing other than in a normal condition are sent home. With the view to sanitation in individual tongue depressors are used in the examinations.

Dr. Cranford reports that the thirteen patients have suffered with only mild cases of the disease.

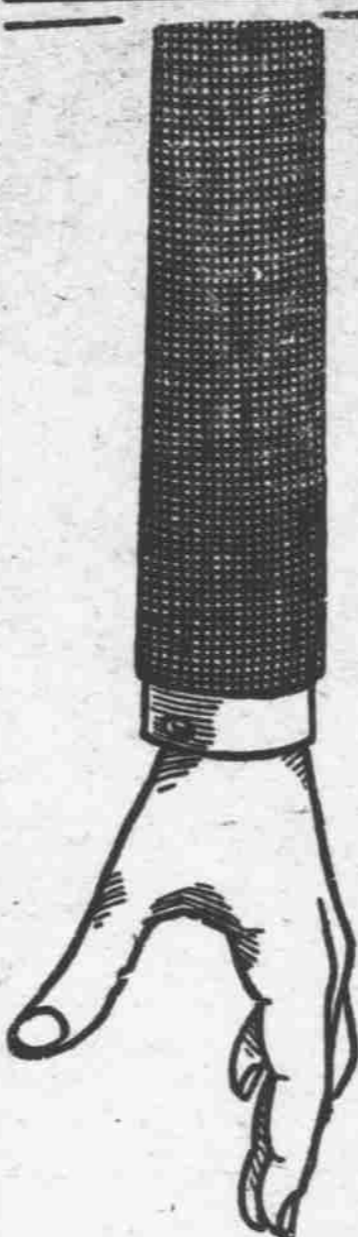

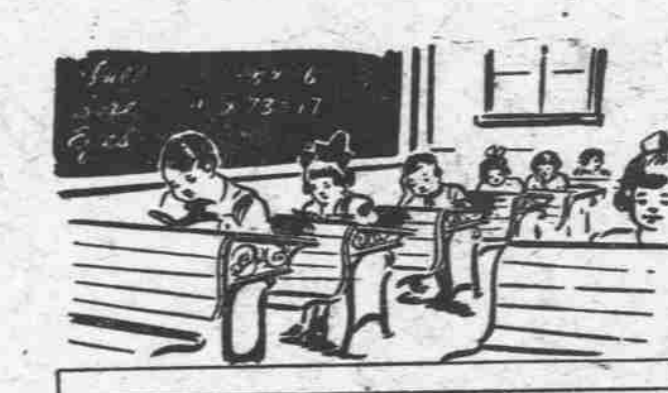
