There is a band stand with rows and rows of seats where one can sit and enjoy the music here. Sunday school classes hold picnics here. There are some twenty-five or more croquet sets at one corner of the park where the Sunshine Pleasure club hold meets every day. At another spot one can see elderly men plying quills, chess, checkers, and everywhere one can see children playing and ladies sitting around at any time during the day embroidering and chatting together. In the evening it is brilliantly lighted, altogether making a perfect bower on earth.
No reason why such a beauty spot could not be started in Hendersonville, which would mean the beginning of a greater and more beautiful Hendersonville. If I might be allowed to suggest, however, I would say that I do not think the St. John hotel site is the best place for it. In the first place it is not large enough nor the best situation to my mind. There is a larger and more attractive spot near Seventh avenue where there is plenty of space to grow in.
If only some fifty or more public spirited men could only be made to see the importance of having just such a park as we have here in Sunshine city and would issue bonds to raise the necessary funds to purchase a tract of land it would mark the beginning of a new era for Hendersonville.
