HOW BIRDS HELP FARMERS.

Millions of Dollars Saved Every Year by Birds Acting as Insect Destroyers; Organize Bird Study Clubs.

There is everywhere a tendency in schools to instill into the hearts and minds of the boys and girls a love for the birds. Chief among the agencies which just now are promoting this beneficent work is the Audubon Society of North Carolina with headquarters in Raleigh. Recently this society has issued a beautiful little folder for distribution among the schools and individuals interested in the successful prosecution of the work. The object of this society is to protect the birds both song and insectivorous, and to acquaint the people, and most especially the farmers, with the fact that birds are the greatest insect destroyers in the world, and not only insect destroyers but weed destroyers as well.

It is said that the corn crop of the United States is injured annually by destructive insects to the amount of \$100,000,000. It is said, also, that insects destroy annually about one-tenth of all the agricultural and forestry products of this country. It is estimated that potato bugs alone cost annually \$17,000,000 to the growers of America. It is claimed further that tobacco growers of the United States lose annually around the sum of \$10,000,000. It is said by statisticians that the fruit growers of the country annually lose approximately \$30,000,000 by destructive insects. Practically all of these insects furnish food for the birds and would largely be exterminated were it not for the ruthless war which is continually waged upon our little feathered friends.

It is claimed by those who have made a study of this matter that fully 98 per cent of the food of wrens is composed of destructive insects which annually make war on the farmers and truck growers of our country. Ninety per cent of the food of bee martins, three-fourths of the food of woodpeckers, and more than three-fourths of the food of bluebirds, is composed of these same injurious insects which are found on the farms and in the orchards everywhere.

Would it not be well for the teachers to organize the boys and girls into a "bird club" before the close of the term? The Liberty Bell Bird Club is an ideal organization for the protection of our feathered friends, and all the necessary literature and full instructions will be gladly furnished free on application.

Enlist the children in this humane work? Have them put up some bird houses this spring. Ask them to furnish some food for the birds when it is scarce. Encourage respect for game laws, and create a sentiment for further protective legislation at the next meeting of the general assembly. And write the United States Department of Agriculture for their bulletins about birds.—C. C. W. in Progressive Farmer.

INDIVIDUALIZE AGAINST FLIES.

It has been said and repeated so many times that some people find in the expression "swat the fly" something at which to laugh, taking it as a species of humor that is being offered.

But this is not so, for the truth is that there is no sner piece of advice in the holding of good health than this same "swat the fly" urging. It means more than merely knocking over a fly at a time, for the advice has behind it the call to the colors to continued battle against flies. And battle is demanded because they are the carriers of disease, the advance guards of death.

Right now the advice to "swat the fly" may be taken literally, for it is spring-time and with dexterous use the fly-swatter can do a lot of fly-extermination as the flies come out of their winter quarters ready to get to work. And each fly that is killed means so many flies less during the summer when there will be so many millions that the swatters will not be able to do the necessary execution. So, the thing to do is to fight against the increase in flies right now.

But prevention is better than fly-swating. Filth is the breeding place for flies, and if you look out upon a place in which flies abound you may well see in it a plant for fly propagation. Old tin cans with water in them, piles of trash which hold some moisture or which have in them articles of decomposition, house sweepings refuse for the kitchen, the accumulations in stables, all these and other filth are fly producers. The thing to do is to get rid of them and so prevent the coming of so many flies.

That disease and death are threatened by the presence of flies no longer needs argument to show. That being recognized the thing to be done is to have a good house cleaning and yard cleaning so as to get rid of all trash and filth that would aid in bringing more flies. The matter is one of so much importance for good health that we trust that the editors of the State will enter at once into a campaign to press home to the people the need to do all that is possible to decrease the number of flies to the minimum.—Raleigh News and Observer
