Save the strip of sandpaper that comes on the match boxes and tack on jamb of coor with tiny Swede tacks; or strips of sandpapersmay be cut five inches long and three-eighths inch wide. Place a tack at each end and one in the middle. This will not interfere with opening and closing of door, and will save steps in running back to get another match.
