

Then there was a talk by Mr. Schooley, State Extension Horticulturist from Raleigh. He gave the people an idea of what is being done along the line of co-operation in the raising and shipping of apples and other fruit in some sections of the country, notably in the. Northwest Mr. Schooley is an expert along this line, having a large apple orchard himself in California. He is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College and knows whereof he speaks. His talk was greatly appreciated. He expressed the desire that a large exhibit of fruit be sent from here to the State Fair at Raleigh.
