## PRACTICAL REFORM

Searching Investigation of Departmental Methods Is Now in Progress.

Washington Post. The manner of conducting business in the departments of the government in all probability will be revolutionized as a result of an investigation now being made under the direction of President Roosevelt. The inquiry is in charge of a committee composed of five of the more prominent younger men of the administration, all of them close personal friends of the President.

James R. Garfield, commissioner of corporations, is understood to be the chairman of this committee of inquiry. Gifford Pinchot, chief forester of the government; Mr. Keep, assistant secretary of the treasury; Mr. Murray, of commerce and labor, and Mr. Hitchcock, first assistant postmaster general, are the other members.

The committee has already made considerable progress, although until this time the public has not been advised of its operations. It is understood that the committee has so far devoted itself to one department, much to the annoyance of the head of that department, who believes, it is said, that the various bureaus under | 1st bass, Sam T.
