> It is important that the government keep close track of the head of every family, and the anwser to the above question, though it may often create considerable wrangling in the household afterward, will be recorded promptly from the person addressed. That is where the women of the family will get the best of the controversy, as it is likely that the men, especially in this county, will be at work when the enumerator puts in an appearance.

> The enumerator will also inquire if you are married, and how many children you have and if your mother is living with you. He will further inquire how many times you have been married, and how long it has been since you were married the last time.

> The foregoing are only a few of the many questions, which, beginning April 15 of this year, will be asked every house-wife in this country by Uncle Sam's army of enumerators. From house to house all
