Washington, June 4.—The finance committee's report of the reciprocity bill to the senate will feature the hearing of the third month of the session of congress. The hearing have continued almost a week on Wednesday the committee will go into executive session to consider its disposition of the bill. In the senate the bill will run through a series of speeches and amendments. At least thirty senators express their opposition to the bill. The democrats and insurgent republicans fail to obtain adequate support to amendments in committee. The bill will seek the first opportunity to present their provisions in the senate. No one counts upon a vote in six weeks of debate.

This kind of event has been annual for a number of years and is always eagerly anticipated by both the old soldiers and the ladies. The occasion this year held special interest because the "Bonnie Blue Flag", the gift of V. C. V. Shepherd was presented.

The ladies had arranged a beautiful program and it was rendered with pleasing effect. The exercises were opened with an invocation by the chapter's chaplain, Dr. R. B. Grinnan. The band then played "Maryland, My Maryland." "The Old North State" was sung, led by Mrs. Schenck, the audience joining. Next, Miss Cora Lott recited, pathetically, Father Ryan's "Furl that Banner"—Following Miss Elsie Anderson gave "Unfurl that Banner," and the President, Miss Lane, unfurled and waved the flag, the entire audience rising to their feet in salutation and enthusiasm and the band struck up "Dixie" amidst loud hurrahs.

Then solemnity reigned while the president pinned several Crosses of Honor upon the breast of as many old soldiers. Then quietly and with many tears "God be with You till We Meet Again" was sung and Melvin Hatch bore the flag, followed first by children of the Daughters, then the Veterans and Daughters, each bearing beautiful floral tributes to dead heroes, which were tenderly placed on and around the Confederate monument on court house square.

The ladies then led the way to the hall where they had prepared refreshments and where the Veterans and all present enjoyed sandwiches and coffee, ice cream and cake and where many reminiscences laughable and many reminiscences sad were exchanged. The old soldiers seemed reluctant to leave, this must have been an evidence of a pleasant day.

### June Records

The Hendersonville weather record for May 1911 shows a mean temperature slightly above the May normal, and precipitation lighter than had ever previously been recorded here in May. The data for last month are: maximum, 88 on the 26th; minimum, 33 on the 7th; mean maximum, 78.6; mean minimum, 50.2; mean, 64.4; precipitation, 1.91 inches.

In many sections of the county the latter part of May was characterized by a hot spell of great intensity. The figures above quoted show that Hendersonville escaped that affliction.
