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REPUBLICAN VICTORY

Democratic Majority in House is Reduced to the Vanishing Point

ELECTED BY MAJORITY

The voters have spoken, and the is no mistaking their verdict.

The Democratic majority in the National House of Representatives is almost wiped out. Early reports indicated that the majority would be reduced from nearly 150 to about 30. Later reports gave 23 as the probable majority; while there are indications that when the official count is made, the figures may dwindle to 15 or to 10 or to 0.

New York State is overwhelmingly Republican, and has elected C. S. Whitman for Governor and J. W. Wadsworth for U. S. Senator.

Our own Congressional district has come out on the right districts, it was estimated tonight that the republicans and democrats elect side, and J. J. Britt is elected by a majority of nearly 1,000.

Henderson county is Republican from top to bottom. The whole county ticket is elected by big majorities. The smallest majority this year is 364, which is larger than the largest two Keating in the second and third Colorada districts. Representative Wilyears ago.
