ANOTHER DIFFICULT PROBLEM

They are going to have an election over in Tennessee on November 4. The campaign, which has been going on for several weeks, is one of the hottest that has ever been waged in the state, in connection with municipal elections.

The registration closed the other day, and if the same ratio prevails in the country towns, as in the larger cities, it would seem that women outnumber men on registration books. In Memphis a very active campaign was carried on for several weeks by the women who made a special effort to procure the registration of more female voters than any other section of the state. So active was the campaign that it appears few negro women are to be found in the city of Memphis whose names are not on the registration books. A quotation from the Memphis Commercial Appeal will serve to show something of the efforts that were put forth to get the names of all women voters on the registration books. The Appeal says:

"A trip through the business section yesterday afternoon was a little discouraging, for one of the facts in regard to the general registration in August, which had caused most comment, was the preponderance of white women who had registered above the negro women. Moreover, in the general registration few women registered in the uptown districts and large numbers enrolled in the residential section of the city.

"When a visit to some of the uptown polling places yesterday showed that many negro women and few white women were registering, for a time it looked as though the women leaders might not be able to point to the figures of the supplemental registration with the pride they had displayed when the figures of the general registration were made public." In other words, in the supplemental registration the number of negro women who registered equaled or exceeded that of white women.

Another interesting quotation from The Appeal follows:

"In the second precinct of the first ward negro women were registering who acknowledged that they did not even know what a registration paper was, but who said they had been told to register and vote.

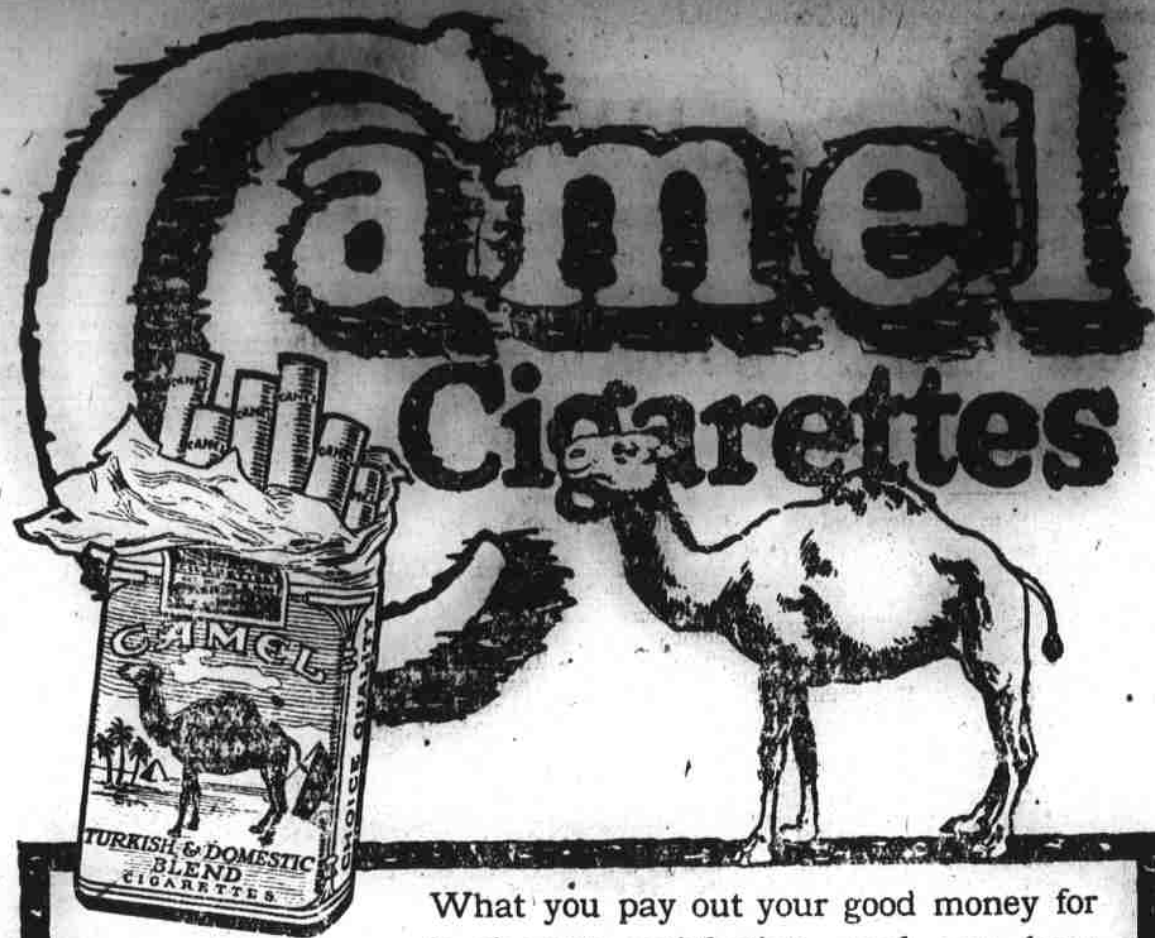
"The heaviest registration found in the uptown section was at the DeSoto hotel on Calhoun avenue, where 65 had registered by 4 o'clock. Of this number all save 4 or 5 were women, and there wasn't a single white woman in the lot."

It is said Democratic workers were especially active in this precinct. Twenty years ago who would have thought the time would come when political workers of the Democratic faith could be seen industriously at work procuring the registration of negro women. But women, in many states, have already been given the right to vote. The state of Tennessee has conferred upon its women the right to vote in municipal elections, and men in their zeal to win an election, even a municipal election, will not let the color of a woman's skin deter them from getting her name on the registration books, if she agrees to support the ticket for which they are working.

The experience the folks in Memphis are now having in getting women registered to vote, will probably be that which will be experienced all over the country in 1920, as it is now thought the suffrage amendment to the federal constitution will be adopted before the campaign of next year comes on.

When women of all colors are allowed to vote what will the men do? This is a question that is agitating the minds of politicians throughout the country. The white men of the south will not want to line up at the polling places with colored women voters, and the disfranchised colored men will not want to stand around the polls and see their wives, sisters and daughters exercising their right to vote, when they are denied that privilege. This, however, is likely to be brought to pass. The only way out of the dilemma that we can see is for the election boards to provide separate polling places for the negro women, and the white men and women, and let the negro men stay at home and do the cooking and take care of the children while the negro women are at the election. If anybody has a better plan for the handling of the proposition we shall be pleased to hear from them.

STATE TAKES ON MORE INSPECTORS

Although the state sanitary law has been in operation but three weeks, the volume of work has become so great that three new inspectors have just been added to the force. These men are Clyde H. Cline, of Newton, Hugh E. Fritts, of Salisbury, and A. E. Terry, of Hamlet, who have been assigned to their respective districts.

Eight counties have already been covered more or less completely by the state inspectors. The favorable fall weather is making it possible for their work to proceed with great rapidity. The addition of three more inspectors will give great impetus to work, so that every community in the state, if possible, will be reached in the first round of inspection before the bad weather of the winter months sets in.
