From the very beginning of the tariff agitation the Constitution has taken the position that with the establishment of protection as the National policy, it would be as absurd as it would be unjust to place tariff duties upon practically all the products of one section of the country and put all of another upon an equivalent of a free trade basis.

Under a protective policy there is no sense or reason in a proposal that high duties should be placed upon all the products of New England, for example, and all tariff charges removed from those things peculiar to or found in largest quantity in the South.

And yet, what is almost incomprehensible from any reasonable viewpoint, Southern Senators, mercenary in politics, have been roundly criticized, both North and South, not for demanding high protective rates, which they have consistently opposed, but for their support of what cannot reasonably be otherwise classed than as purely revenue rates upon products of this section.—Atlanta Constitution.
