He demonstrated the Thermos Coffee Pot, invented by the late Marion Harland, noted cook and dietician; then came a pot roast prepared without grease, water or flour, browned, tender and delicious; in the same pot were onions, potatoes and rice, each food retaining its own particular flavor; griddle cakes, such as old southern negro cooks prided themselves in service, fried without a particle of grease; a cake baked without an oven or an oil stove. Neither coffee nor the other foods emitted the slightest odor.

Mr. Boell was assisted by Mr. W. F. Holland, who is the local dealer in Wear-ever kitchen equipment.

In this interesting and comprehensive lecture, Mr. Boell dwelt on the growing interest in domestic science among college women, more important to the welfare of our nation than any other factor. He stated that many cases of insanity, inebriates and criminals were traceable to malnutrition during childhood due to ignorance of proper diets.

On Friday afternoon Miss Hattie Neill met with the club at the home of Mrs. Roy Miller, and gave a fine demonstration of egg cookery. Friday evening at 7:30 Mrs. M. M. Young was hostess to a second "kitchen party" given for the benefit of those who were prevented from attending the afternoon party. Both parties were well attended and much valuable information gleaned from the lectures and demonstrations.

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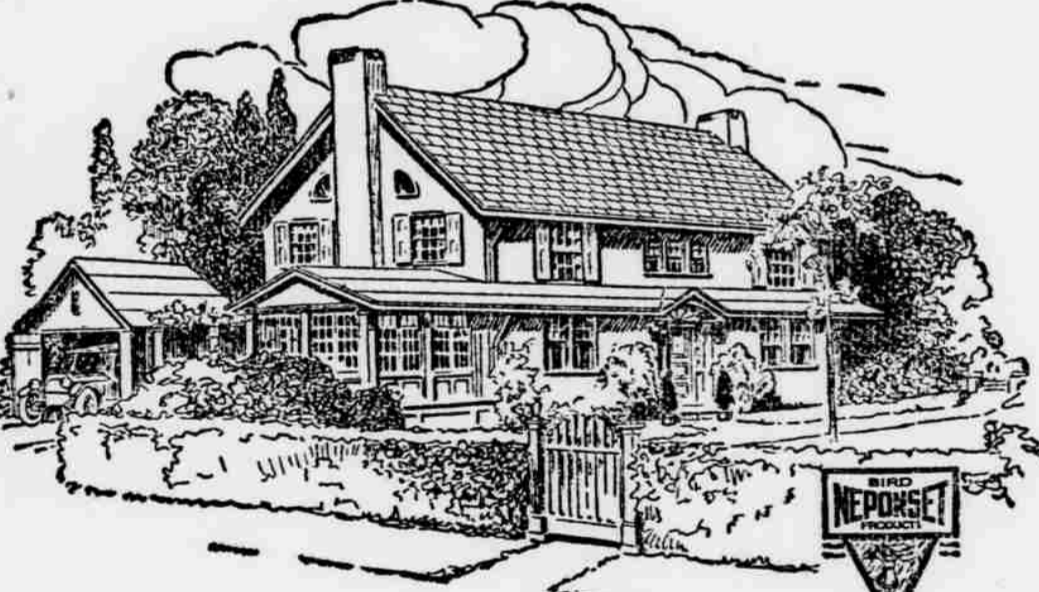
