BOY SCOUTS ATTEND ANNIVERSARY MEET

Piedmont Council Boy Scouts Attend Services in Stevens Tabernacle In Gastonia.

The members of the Piedmont Council, Boy Scouts of America, embracing the counties of Lincoln, Gaston, Cleveland and Rutherford, numbering a thousand men and boys observed the fifteenth anniversary of the movement in America by assembling together on Sunday afternoon, February 8th, at 3:00 o'clock at the Stevens Tabernacle, Gastonia, for the purpose of holding a Special Boy Scout service. Rev. Dr. Prettyman, delivered a strong sermon in the interest of the Boy Scouts and the boyhood of America.

The services on Sunday afternoon were open to the public and parents and friends of boyhood in this section. A choir of five hundred voices rendered music for the occasion.

With roll call and welcome the Scouts were ushered into the first annual National Scout Sunday by Commissioner Gillespie, who introduced Dr. Prettyman.

Dr. Prettyman, in a strong and forceful address, urged the boys to look forward to "A Manly Life," first by self discovery, second by selfmastery and third by self-expression.


