Rutherfordton, May 19 .- In part the report of the grand jury submitted to Judge John M. Oglesby, presiding at the term of the Rutherford criminal court, follows: "We have examined the county court house and find that the same is in bad condition and that the same is too small and inadequate. The offices are not large enough to take care of the business and to provide the proper filing space for records. The toilets are insufficient and cannot be properly maintained and kept and are in bad condition. The roof is leaking and the supports which sustain the same are partially decayed, and we therefore, recommend that the court house be remodeled, provided the same can be done at a reasonable same can be done in a satisfactory manner without jeopardizing the safety of the building on account of insecure foundation, and without destroying the light in the offices, or without injuring the architectural design and appearances of the same. In the event that the said building cannot be repaired, in satisfactory manner without producing the results named, we then recommend the erection of an adequate, modern fireproof, court house upon the present court house lot."
