STAR MAIL ROUTE CONTRACT AWARDED

(Gaffney Ledger)

Chancey C. Brackett, of Hollis, N. C., was the successful bidder for the star mail route to be inaugurated from Gaffney to Rutherfordton, N. C., June 15, according to information received by Postmaster F. B. Gaffney from the postoffice department in Washington.

Mr. Brackett's bid was \$1,690 per annum. A contract is to be made to cover the period from June 15, 1925, to June 30, 1928, or slightly more than three years.

News that Mr. Brackett's bid had been accepted by the postoffice department was also received here yesterday by the Insurance Trust Com-

pany in a letter from Henry J. Findley, an attorney of Washington.

The star route covers a distance of 31.6 miles, from Gaffney to Rutherfordton, N. C., and will serve the following points: Cliffside, Henrietta, Avondale, Caroleen, Forest City, Spindale and Rutherfordton.
