Everyone today appreciates the superiority of pure-bred livestock over scrub stock, but appreciation of the greater value of pure-bred seeds for crops is just beginning to dawn. Experts have estimated that the value of North Carolina's farm crops would be increased between 20 and 30 per cent by the use of pure-bred, selected and graded seeds. "Field selected seed corn is easily worth \$10 per bushel, as compared to crib selected corn at regular prices. Cottonseed of the right variety, cleaned and graded, are worth \$5 to \$10 per bushel, as compared with ordinary seed at 50 cents per bushel, and almost the
