Pledges to Support Move At Tuesday's Meeting-Officers Elected.

At the regular monthly meeting Tuesday at the Isothermal Hotel in Rutherfordton, the Rutherford County club went on record as endorsing the Great Smoky Mountain National Park proposition and pledged their support. This being the regular luncheon of the club, members from all parts of the county were in attendance. Kenneth S. Tanner, as retiring president presiding. The annual election of officers being also scheduled for the day, brought out an unusually large attendance.

As main spokesman for the committee Mr. Marvel gave a vivid explanation of the plan to secure a national park and pointed out the benefits to be derived. As a final wind up, Mr. Marvel said:
