Why Should Some Members Pay Nothing For Support Of the Church?

Does this question mean that there are some who belong to the church who never pay anything to its support? Does only a portion, often a small per cent, pay the larger and some times all that is required to maintain the church? To ask these questions is to answer them. If any one doubts it let him make the test for himself.

The church is supported by voluntary contributions. I know of no other benevolent institution that is so maintained. There is no fixed membership fee to join the church, neither are there stated and arbitrary dues with a set time to pay them.

Yet every one who joins the church assumes a moral obligation to give of his means to the upkeep of the same. The failure to keep this obligation is not always justly chargeable to the violator of it. In every church there are certain ones who have been charged with the temporal affairs of the church. The nature of their position and the trusts committed to them pre-supposes that they will immediately see every one coming into the fold and find out how much he is willing to contribute to the upkeep, or support of the church he has voluntarily joined. But a lack of disposition or a willingness to take the time and put forth the effort to do this is the great reason for many failing to contribute of their means to maintain and advance the kingdom.

Very few will flatly refuse if promptly, regularly and tactfully approached. It takes time, wisdom and prayer to do this. And wherever this is done the expenses of the church are paid with comparative ease and by practically all its members and that without delay and undue and unfair strain on any of its membership.

On the other hand, where every member is not canvassed and a subscription not secured a comparatively few have to bear the burden, payments are not promptly met, finances run behind, the year closes with salaries and benevolences partly unpaid, or the faithful few have to strain themselves to pay an extra amount to make up for those who would have helped had they been asked to do at the right time and in the right way. Brethren, these things ought not so to be.
