# PNEUMONIA FATAL • TO E. L. WHITESIDES **NEAR CAROLEEN**

Caroleen, March 23 .- A death that came as a severe shock to many friends and relatives was that of Mr. E. L. Whitesides, which occurred at his home near here Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock, following a short illness of about a week. He was taken ill with influenza and about three days before his death, contracted building. At a special meeting of pneumonia, rapidly growing worse until death ended his suffering.
