Judge Webb and Judge Stack to Preside-Jurors Selected -The Calendar.

Rutherfordton, May 5 .--- Criminal Court will convene here Monday, May 10, with Judge Jas. L. Webb, of Shelby, presiding over the first week, in which it is expected to dispose of the criminal docket of about 100 cases. Fifty of these cases are continued from other courts. The charges against the various defendants are for violation of liquor laws, reckless driving, embezzlement, larceny, etc.

Judge A. M. Stack will preside over the civil term.

L. C. Haynes, colored, will be tried for killing and burning the body of Johnny Johnson. It will be recalled that the crime took place between Forest City and Ellenboro Christmas week when Haynes killed and burned the body of his victim. He has been in jail here since.
