SECOND PRIMARY TO BE HELD JUNE 3

To Select Winners For County Commissioners, Recorder and Register of Deeds.

The Democratic primary Saturday, passed quietly with a fair vote being cast.

The official vote is tabulated on this page.

Senator Overman and Congressman Weaver were winners in their contests.

Winners in this county were Hon. Thos. J. Moss, for Legislature, and W. C. Hardin, for sheriff.

Three races will be run over in a second primary, to be held July 3, when Price, Grose and Deck will contest the old board of county commissioners. O. C. Erwin will run against J. P. Bean for recorder, and W. O. Geer and M. T. Wilkie will contest for register of deeds.

PROF. A. C. LOVELACE HEAD SHELBY SCHOOLS

Prof. A. C. Lovelace, native of Rutherford county who was superintendent of schools at Sylva in Jackson county, has been elected by the city school board as High school principal of the Shelby schools, to succeed Prof. J. Horace Grigg who recently resigned to become county superintendent of education in Cleveland county.

Prof. Lovelace was first principal of Round Hill Academy in Rutherford county and later attended Wake Forest college where he was

graduated in 1916. While there he took a high stand in academic work and was assistant in English in the college. After his graduation he was professor of English in Coker College, Hartsville, S. C., while Dr. E. Walter Sikes was president of the institution. At the outbreak of the war he enlisted for service and made a splendid record. After his discharge he returned to his native county of Rutherford and for five years was principal of that school. For the past two years he has been superintendent of the Sylva graded school.

Prof. Lovelace is splendidly equipped for his duties and the school officials of Shelby feel fortunate in being able to find a man that is so well qualified for the position.

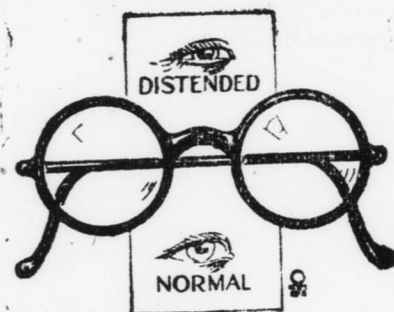
